On completion of a 1,150 mile pipeline, it will take 26 days to move a barrel of oil between Edmonton and Superior, Wisc.

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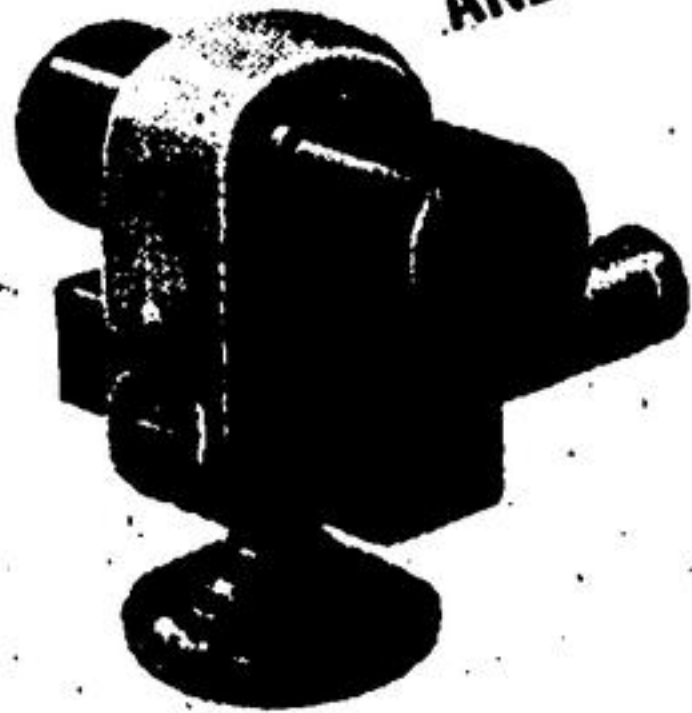
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
