YARD BEAUTIFUL CONTEST STARTS NEXT WEEK

Saturday is the closing date in the Yard Beautiful contest which is being sponsored for the first time this year by Georgetown Lions Club. The contest is designed to observe the general appearance of the town and prizes of \$15, \$10 and \$5 are offered in each of the owners and renters classes.

Circulars describing the contest were mailed recently to all residents whose names appear on the Voters List and extra copies of these are available at Ernie's Radio from Cecil Davidson who is in charge of the contest for the club.

To date there have been only a small number of entries and those wishing to compete in the contest are urged to enter by Saturday. The prizes are worth winning and the spirit of competition will add zest to your gardening this year.

A different basis of judging will be used for owned homes and rented homes, the bulk of the points in the latter being awarded for cleanliness of front and back yard, while in the owners' section, there is more detail required in things which a property owner may buy to improve his grounds.

Three judges will choose the winners and the contest will run from May 15th to June 17th.

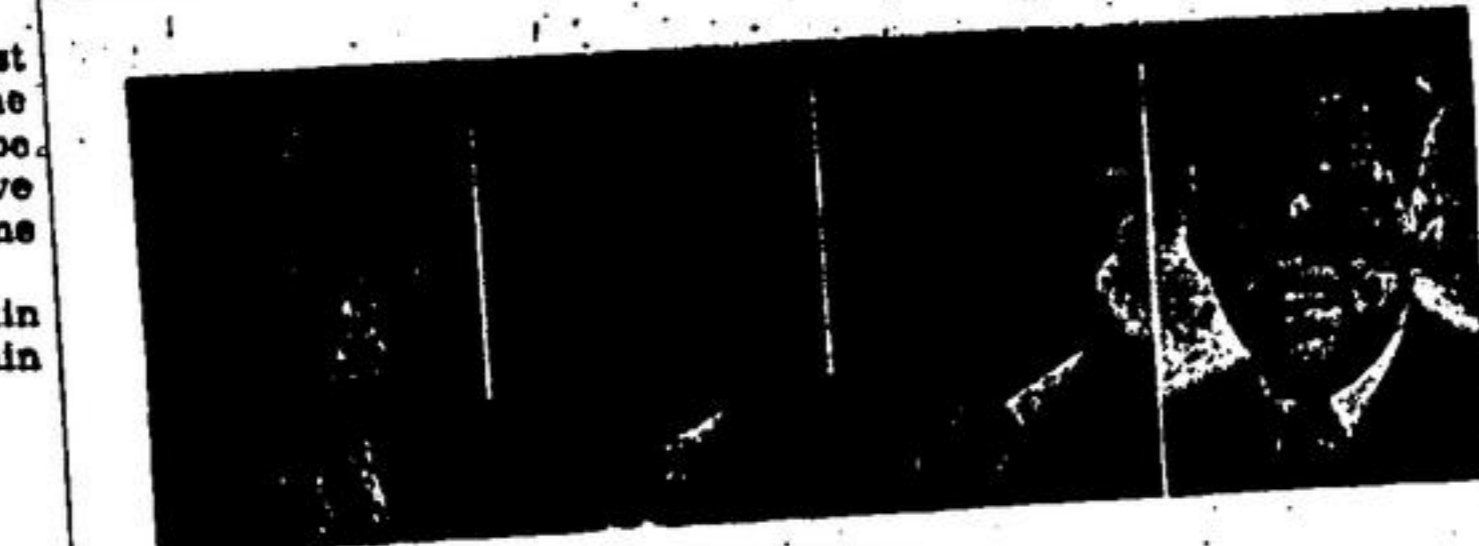


MRS. EDWARD RUTTER
