Dies Suddenly at 7th Line Home

Edwin Henry Hicken died suddenly at his home on the 7th Line, Georgetown on Monday, May 1st. Born at Elmwood Farm, Warwickshire, England, on April 18th, 1887, he was a son of the late Edward Hicken and Lucy Wise. He and his wife, the former Emily A. Chick, came to Canada in 1911, making their home in Toronto and Mount Dennis. He was employed at the Canadian Kodak Company for eleven years as a stationary engineer, then ill health forced him to leave and he came to Georgetown where he had since made his home on the 7th Line. In 1929 he became an employee of the lower mill of Provincial Paper Ltd. where, he worked for some fourteen years when ill health again forced his retirement. He is survived by his wife, one son Edward (Ted), three daughters Mrs. W. A. Emslie (Lucy), Mrs. T. W. Clapham (May), and June and one grandson, Melvyn Hicken, all of Georgetown. One brother, Frank and a niece live at Ufferson and two nephews in Toronto. He was a member of St. John's Church of England, Stewarttown, and of the Canadian Order of Chosen Friends. The funeral service at the McClure Funeral Home on Wednesday was conducted by Rev. J. E. Maxwell. Pallbearers were a nephew, George Hicken, John Standish, Joseph Standish, Ian Emslie, Walter Brandford and Sam Milham. Interment was made in Greenwood Cemetery, Georgetown.
