Three Firsts to High School—Alfred Tost, June Clarke, Arvo Both Gold Medallists

Peel Music Festival, which this year was held in Brampton had one of the largest entries in its history. Many young people from this district took advantage of the opportunity to enter the open events and several from Norval districts were entered in the classes which were closed to Peel County. The festival was particularly of local interest because Kenneth R. Harrison, young local musician, received the appointment of official accompanist and also had many of his piano and voice pupils entered in the various classes.

The musical standards of Georgetown were well upheld by the high school glee club and the girls' triple trio, both of which placed first. One double trio tied with Brampton for first place, each with 82 points, and a second double trio had 80 points. Alfred Tost was first in oratorio for men; Tommy Lee Leslie won first prize for boys under 10 and his brother Keith 2nd for boys under 7; Betty Jean Anderson won first prize in two classes, under 12 and under 13. A former-Georgetown girl, June Clarke, who now lives in Brampton, was the gold medal soprano soloist and Mrs. Clark Lyons, Norval was second. Miss Clarke was also first in lyric soprano and Mrs. Lyons second in soprano solo for girls under 21. Little Constance Lindner of Norval received third prize for pre-school girls.

The class for pre-school boys was won by Jackie Morrison of Brampton, whose mother, the former Thelma Capps and grandfather Ed Capps are both well-known musicians. Mr. Capps is music teacher at Georgetown High School. John Corkett of Norval was second in this class and his brother Robert was also an entrant.

A number of voice pupils taught by Mr. Harrison entered the festival in the open competition. Paul Cunningham and Douglas Wrigglesworth were 3rd and 4th for boys under 10. Peter Carney, Norval was 2nd and Terry Ritchie and John Wilson, Norval tied for 4th for boys under 8. Billy Farmer was 4th for boys under 12. Bob Hill and Bob Carey were 4th in boys under 11.
