Murfin Sheet Metal Works Moves to Main Street

An important business change occurs this week when Frank Murfin opens his new show room on Main Street in the premises formerly occupied by Georgetown Furniture Sales. He is moving his whole business, which he operates under the name B. F. Murfin Sheet Metal Works from its former location, on John Street to the Main Street building. The front half of the store will be used as a display room for furnaces and plumbing fixtures and the shop will be located in the back part of the building. He expects to terminate negotiations this week for the sale of the John Street building to another local business firm.

Mr. Murfin has been engaged in the unsmiling business since he first started work at the age of fourteen and before coming to Georgetown he worked with various firms in Toronto and the Niagara district. He was in the army for four years and after discharge in 1945 started his own business here, his first shop being in a building at the rear of the Lavale Knitting Company. In 1947 he purchased the building formerly used as a warehouse by the Dayfoot Shoe Company, made extensive alterations and converted it into a modern shop.

The firm does sheet metal work, sheetpiling and plumbing as well as installing heating and air conditioning units. It is local agent for Toridheet oil burners and Anthe-Imperial furnaces. At present five men are on the staff, Cecil Brown, Tim Scratch, Jim Stewart, Mr. Murfin's brother Ralph and his brother-in-law Vic Greigose. The firm is well-known locally as well as in the neighbouring towns of Acton, Milton and Brampton.

Frank has taken an active part in Lions Club work and served this past year as vice-president of the hockey club. With his wife, the former Eve Clarke, and two young daughters, he lives on Maple Avenue where he built a home a few years ago.

VETERAN TEACHERS RETIRE FROM PUBLIC SCHOOL STAFF

Two new teachers will join the Georgetown Public School staff next term. Harold Henry has been hired as assistant principal and will teach one of the senior grades and Miss Luana Campbell has also accepted a position with the staff. Two veteran teachers without record of service is understood, will retire - Misses Hazel Harrison and May Langan.

Mr. Henry, a native of Wingham has taught for the past two years in a fifty pupil school at Blinvale near Wingham and prior to that taught for two years at other schools in the same inspectorate. A young, single man he holds his interim First Class certificate, has six credits toward his B.A. degree at the University of Western Ontario a course in arts and crafts and intends taking a summer course in manual training, which he will teach at the school.

Miss Campbell is no stranger to town, being a resident here since 1919. She lives on George Street with her mother Mrs. George Campbell and commutes to her position as principal of Maple Grove school in Trafalgar. Since graduating from Toronto Normal School she taught for two years at Munn's School and has held her present position for several years. She is a native of Ballinacraig and is a member of St. John's United Church.

Misses Langan and Harrison have the unique record of being together almost continuously since they first were pupils at the school. They were in the same class in public and high school, roomed together while attending Milton Model School and at Toronto Normal and are completing their fortieth year as staff members. Miss Harrison has what is believed to be a record of teaching altogether 41 1/2 years in Georgetown, and also taught briefly at Glen Williams, Mount Dennis and Weston. Miss Langan taught for a few years at No. 8 Nasagaweya, Burlington and Palmerston.

Both teachers were born in town. Miss Harrison is a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. R. E. Harrison and her father was principal of the public school from 1882 to 1894. She has taught Grade 4 for many years and from 1929 to 1938 was in full charge of music at the school, sharing these duties with Mrs. James Evans for five years after that. Her sister, Mrs. J. M. McKinley of Toronto also trained as a teacher and taught at the 7th Line School, Midland and Fort William before her marriage. Her brother, Perc was town clerk and treasurer until his retirement a few years ago and is treasurer of the Public School Board. Miss Langan is a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Langan and her father operated a grain elevator at the station. He was a member of the school board for several years.

Mrs. Anna Nielsen 94 Town's Oldest Resident Honoured at Roxy Party

Georgetown's oldest lady, Mrs. Anna Nielsen, who will be 95 this coming September was honoured at a special show at the Roxy Theatre last Thursday when a special Mother's Day program had been arranged. Wheldon Emerson was emcee for a stage program which included songs by Thomas Barnes, Jean Harley and a quartette composed of Messrs. Barnes, Emerson, Jim Burns, and Charles Tyler. Mrs. John Barber was at the piano.

Mrs. Nielsen received many gifts from local merchants, including an orchid corsage from Norton Floral; hat, Silver's; hairdress, Vogue Beauty Parlor; heating pad, McClure's; candy, Steamer's Inn, cake, Webb's Bakery; dinner for 4, the Mc Gibbon House; brooch, Barber's; portrait, Albert Simson; stockings, McGowan's; and a ride to the theatre by Scott Motor Sales. In 1941 she sold her home in Ludington and resided with her daughter, Mrs. Frank Johnson in Merced, California, for a year. In 1942 at the age of 86 she travelled alone by train to Georgetown to live with her only son, Dr. Albert Nielsen. She still enjoys excellent health, likes to take long walks, writes all her own letters and has retained all her faculties except her hearing.
