## Many Players Try Out With The Baseball Raiders

With baseball opening this Saturday at the local park, a few notes on some of the available baseball material might be in order this week. One thing is sure — there are plenty of players to make up a good team if all those who have evinced an interest in trying for a berth with the baseball Raiders come out to practice.

Casch "Fat" Walters has a lot of baseball "know-how" tucked away in his head and his experience should prove valuable to the Raiders. In case some of the newcomers to town haven't heard about the coach, he is one of the best ball players Georgetown has produced. A few years back he played semi-pro for Springfield against such hot competition as Aylmer, St. Thomas and Tillsonburg. Not only was he an ace pitcher but his batting prowess was so good that on days when he wasn't pitching he was switched to the outfield to lend batting strength to the team.

Manager Bruce MacKenzie, after doing a good job in a similar capacity for the hockey team this year has taken over similar duties for baseball and has been a faithful attendant at practices. Bruce has what it takes to iron out all the rough spots which a manager runs into and can be counted on to do his best for the team.

The Raiders will miss Donnie Herrington this year from the pitching roster. Donnie is taking treatment at Weston San. for a bothersome leg trouble and though he won't be on the mound we know he will be in the spirit. Scotty Patterson, always a tower of strength, who can play any position, has his pitching arm back and is figured on to provide strength in the hurling department. Mel Spence, who pitched one perfect game last year, is also sure of seeing action. Harvey Chappel has been in northern Ont. with Hal Gibson and it is not certain whether either or both of these last year regulars will be wearing a town uniform this year. Harvey would certainly be missed for he is one of the best pitchers to hit Georgetown for many a year. Hal would be equally missed behind the plate or at short stop.

Glenn Gibbs, who pitched for the juveniles a few years ago and Bill Berry, who used to pitch, as well as playing outfield and infield with Simcoe are possible pitchers this year. Fred Lawrence, who came here from Port Dover to goal tend for the Raiders played first base and pitched for his home team and is interested in trying out for the team.

Cliff Norton, veteran catcher should get the nod for the king-pin position on the team. Spike Scott, who lined up with Acton Tanners last year, but played his hockey for Georgetown last winter, is also a prospect and the club is hoping that he will lend his catching talent to the line-up.

There are at least half a dozen possibilities for the infield. Rene Martin, who only played a few games last year before he was sidelined with an injured knee, is back and Bud Hoare is also out again. Kent Storey, fresh from hockey season down east may be back in the line-up and Don Barrager is rumored to be interested in an infield position. Berry and Gibson are also possibilities for the infield.

A broken finger which he suffered at work last week may keep veteran George Chaplin away from his accustomed spot in the outfield, though fans are hoping not. Fleet-footed Ev Wilson will again be on the team, though this year he may switch to an infield position. Ev is one of the fastest men on the team and specializes in stealing bases. Ken Nash and Pie Dillon will be back in the line-up. Others who have indicated a desire to be on the team include Bill Muir, who played in a couple of games last year. Raider stars Jack Kemshead and Junior Beaumont and Norval's Joe Schertel, back from another season of pro hockey in the States.

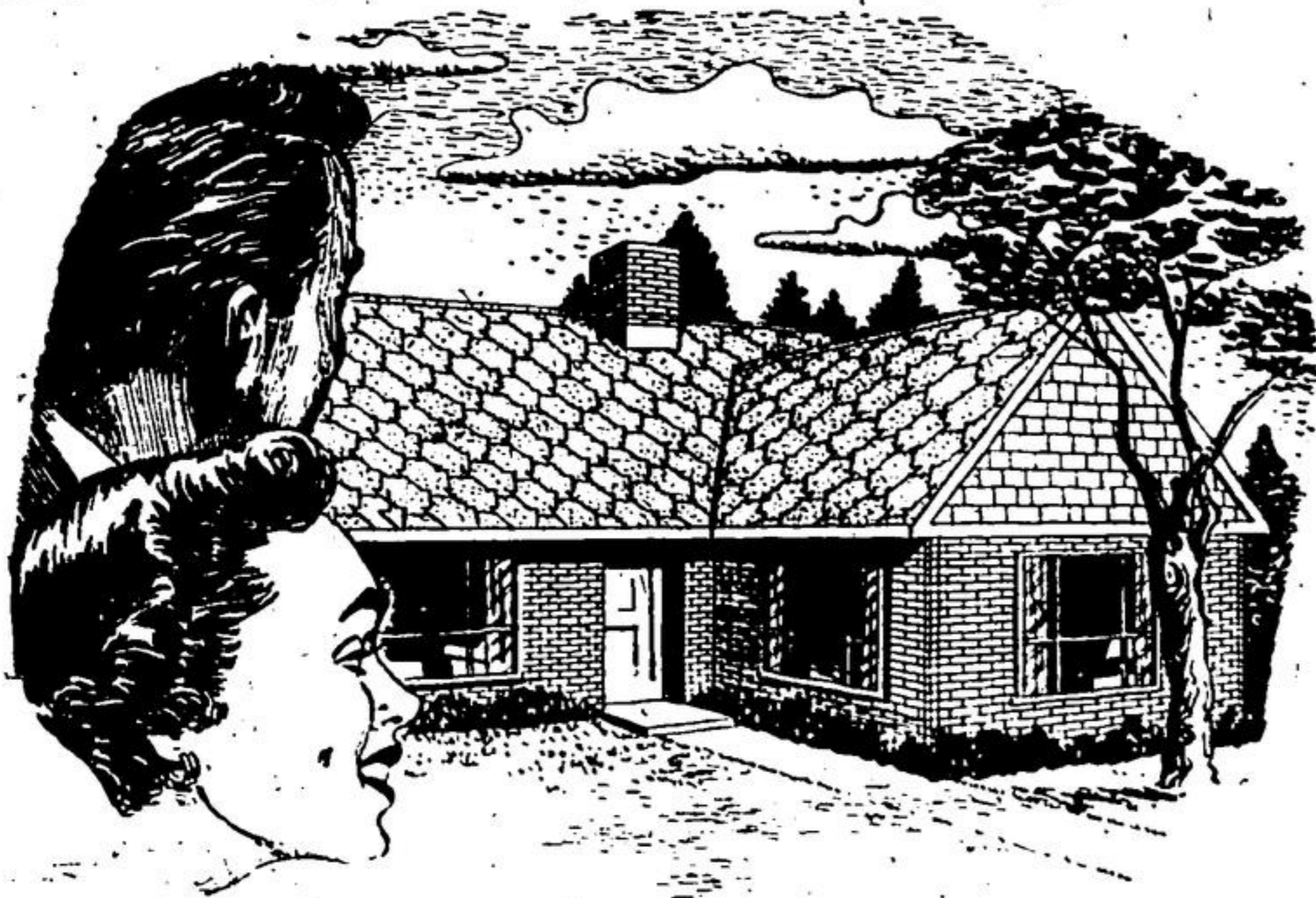
