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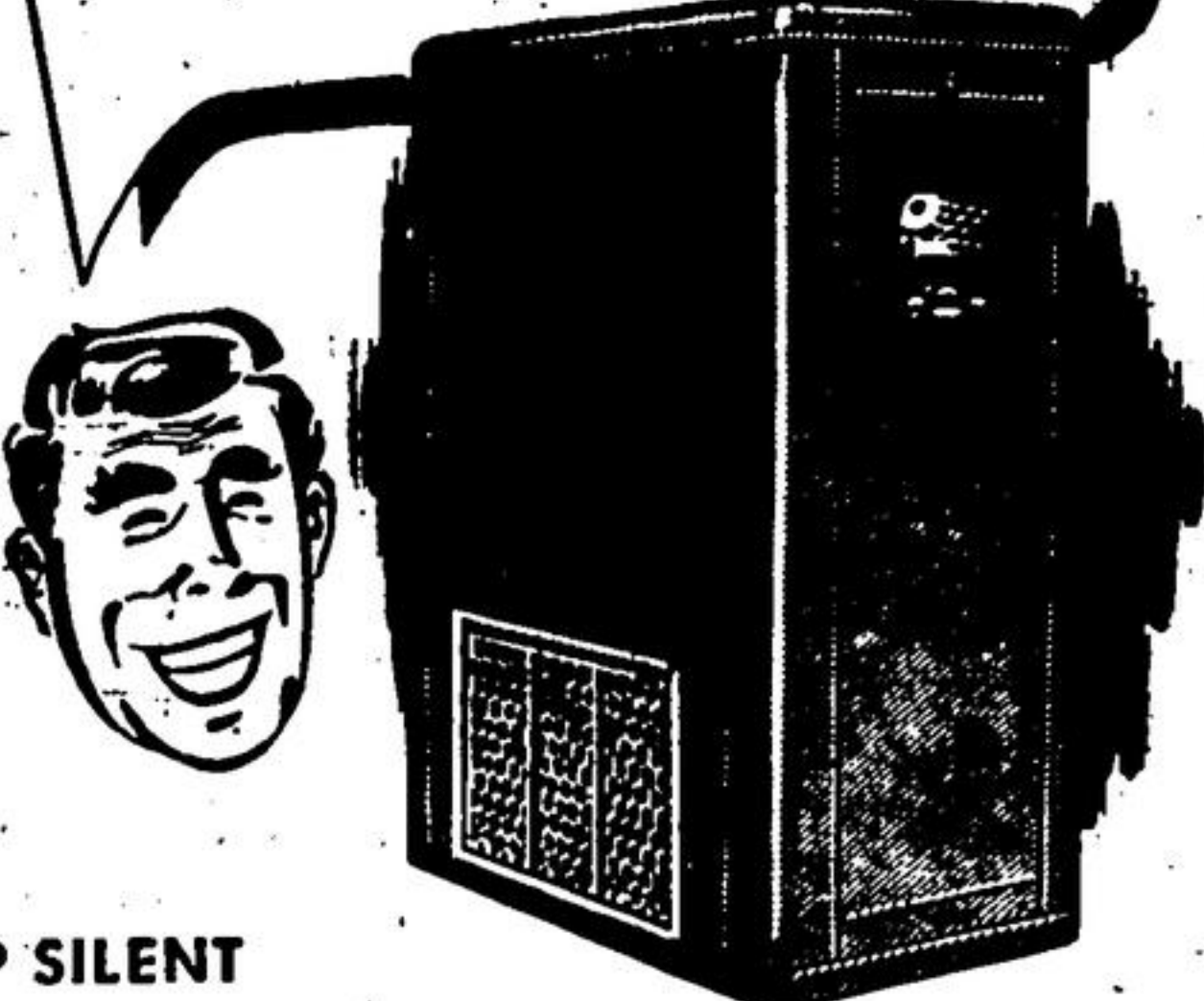
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**Chatting** By M.H.B.
