Alliance Paper Mills Ltd. is making every effort to solve the problem of mill waste. Mill manager Clifford Boutelle gave this assurance to council . when he appeared before them to discuss the matter Monday night. The council, after receiving complaints about the situation from a group of residents the along Paper Mill Road, had contac-

Mr. Boutelle said that since the mill was built in 1910, it had been discharging waste onto the flats below the mill. The company had long recognized that this method be disposal was unsatisfactory and had hoped that the new sewerage aystem would take care of it. When it was found that it would not, it had been a disappointment. The sewerage engineer had then said that if the waste could be treated so that the residue was 50 parts per million solids, the system could take it. but investigation proved that the town water which is drunk itself contains more solids. Requests for the engineer to come and investigate had been ignored until last summer, when he said he would have a waste sample analyzed and report how it could be handled. A sample was obtained some time later, but 50.00 no analysis had been received to 5.00 | date.

Meanwhile, the milt was paying frontage tax on a sewerage system which it could not use and was anxious to get value from it. At present, the settling tanks are being rearranged to double their capacity. An American company is being consulted about the problem of removing solids from the waste. Councillor Harry Hale suggested

that it might be possible to pipe the waste from the mill to the river and Council and Mr. Boutelle agreed that this was worth looking into. The waste is not harmful and would have no effect on fish life in the river. The town is quite willing to grant a right-of-way for the laying of such a pipe, and # would overcome to a great extent. the odour aulsance along Papermil
