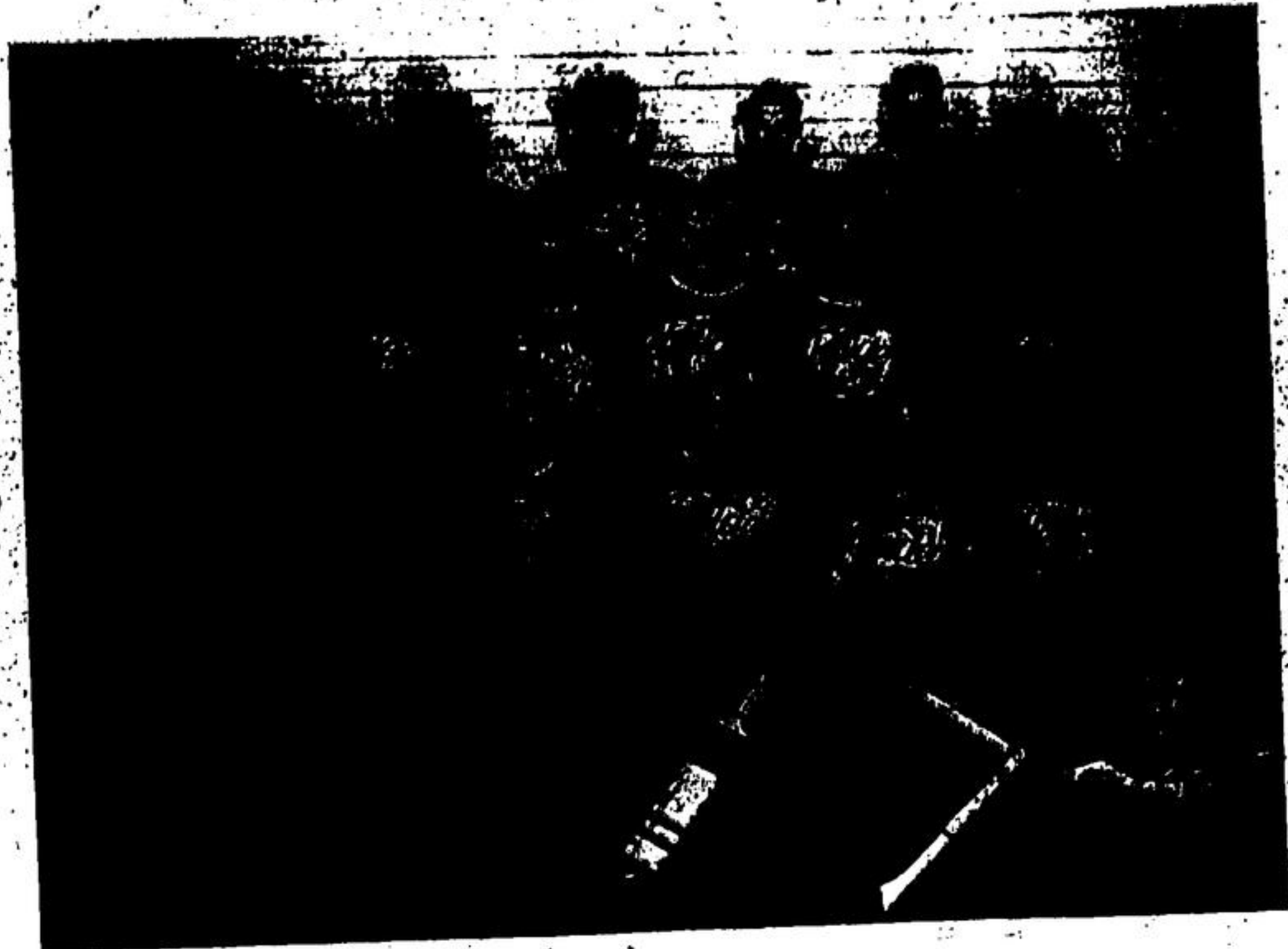


THE 1950 CHAMPS
