Flood Relief Fund Reaches \$1800 Total

Donations Pour In to Help Manitoba Flood Victims—Many Events Planned To Raise More Money.

In the first week of the Georgetown and District Campaign for Manitoba Flood Relief a total of \$1800 has been donated by individuals and organizations. With many more events planned to raise funds there is no saying where the total will reach. A conservative guess would be that by next week the fund will pass the \$2500 mark. Branch 120, Canadian Legion has played a strong part to date with donations totalling \$150. The Legion, Lions Club and Board of Parks are combining on a monster bingo game on next Wednesday and the branch is also earmarking proceeds of this Friday's dance and social to the fund. Employees of the two paper mills and Smith and Stone have contributed \$756 with Smith & Stone sending an extra \$100 to union headquarters. A donation of \$5 from the girls of Cedarvale School was accompanied by a letter signed by Elsie Klahrich said: "This five dollars has been saved up in the weekly collection in our Sunday School. We know it's not much, but it means a lot to us and we hope it will help someone in need." Norval Juniors are donating proceeds of their dance at Huttonville next Wednesday to the fund and money raised by the Margaret Bradley - Bruce Harding piano recital sponsored by St. George's Choir will also go to the fund.

NO. 1 CGRU COLONEL IS A VISITOR IN TOWN

Col. R.W. Frost of London, England, who was in command of No. 1 Canadian General Reinforcement Unit in World War 2 is visiting for the month of June with Lt. Col. and Mrs. John R. Barber. This unit was the one to which the Lorne Scots Regiment was attached and many local men served under his command. Colonel Frost has been overseas commissioner for the Canadian Red Cross since 1944.

The Lorne Scots Band will compete at the Waterloo Band Festival in June.

Health Unit Report Shows Full Immunization Program

With a full program of immunization against such diseases as diphtheria, smallpox, and whooping cough, regular health check ups of school children, child health clinics and sanitary inspections, Halton Health Unit recently issued a comprehensive booklet of activities in the county in 1949.

The health unit, which is headed by Dr. James M. Mather is jointly maintained by the provincial government and the county, each paying \$20,500 towards its maintenance. A large share of the expenditures, over \$26,000 is paid in salaries and transportation, administration expenses totalling about \$4500.

Miss Jennette Gillespie is supervisor of nurses and Dr. B. J. O'Meara joined the unit last year as dental inspector, Halton being one of the test counties where the government is paying the whole bill for a program of dental health study of school children. Most municipalities, Georgetown and Esqueing included, are paying the cost of necessary dental work recommended by Dr. O'Meara. Deputy Reeve Kenneth MacDonald is a Georgetown member of the county Board of Health which administers the affairs of the Unit.

Town Has Most 1949 Communicable Diseases

Georgetown had the highest number of communicable diseases reported in 1949 by any municipality in Halton, according to the annual report of Halton Health Unit. Chickenpox and mumps were the main offenders in diseases reported. Town figures were:

In the county, total of 811, chickenpox accounted for 312 cases and mumps was second with 69.
