WITH THE ANGLERS

One month of the 1950 trout season has passed. Three and a half more to go. That should be ample time for someone to tie into an old lunker. When we say lunker, we mean a Brown trout of 10 lbs. or more. Somewhere in the Credit there are fish of this size. Probably the largest Brown taken in this district was caught by Bud Kautzer last year. It weighed 6 1/2 lbs. and was caught on a spinning tackle. Perhaps Bud will break his own record one of these days.
Spinning has certainly taken some nice fish this season and is becoming more popular every week. The spinning rod was made to do what the bait casting and fly rods can't do. The lures used are too heavy for a fly rod and too light for a bait casting rod. With a slight flick of the wrist a long cast can be made. There isn't any real drag to prevent a back-lash because the reel spool doesn't revolve while casting.

Lucky Anglers
At last there is an entry in the senior trout contest sponsored by the Hunters and Anglers Association. Jim Cafell has entered a nice 22 1/4 inch fish weighing 4 lbs., 4 ounces. A very nice fish to start things off.

Bill Schenk took a nice 20" Brown last week. Both these fish were caught on spinning tackle.

The Writer and son George, Jr., caught some nice speckled trout at Eugenia last week below the fill-way. The shad flies are starting to hatch up there so in two or three weeks fly fishing should be good. A despair fly works very well during the day with a crane or a devil bug the best bait from dusk to dark. These last two are used to imitate a shad fly after it comes to the surface.

Something Interesting
A large Brown trout weighing ten lbs. was caught in Williams Lake last year. A party of anglers noticed this fish chasing minnows near the surface. Everything but the boat oars were used to try and catch him. Finally they rowed to shore and selected a new lure from a tackle box, went back and hooked the lunker. It took the best part of one hour to bring the Brown to net. It's slow fishing in Williams Lake but big ones are there to reward the patient angler.

Bob Lockhurst, his brother John, and Peter Farmer returned from a fishing trip to the Parry Sound district with a good catch of 8 pickerel, the largest weighing 13 1/2 lbs. and 8 pike, one of which weighed 10 lbs. and measured 43". They stayed at Herbert Graham's camp. All the pike were caught on pikey minnow lures.
Another week end fishing party to Peterborough comprised Dave Stamp, Harry Mann and Maurice Herbert. They caught 11 pike, the largest being 26 1/2" long.
