Georgetown Must Build A NEW Public School NOW

Georgetown is growing:

Our own Board of Education Survey shows that:

BY SEPTEMBER, 1952 — 14 classrooms will be required to accommodate 495 pupils.

BY SEPTEMBER, 1954 — 17 classrooms will be required to accommodate 576 pupils.

And, at present, we have only 11 classrooms!

Building an Addition won't solve the problem

because only 2 rooms can be added to the old building. By the time they're ready, we'll need more. And then what?

This would cost Georgetown Taxpayers about \$50,000, and what would they have to show for it?

There's no suitable space to rent

It would just be pouring Taxpayers' money down the drain to renovate and utilize space in the Town Hall or Library.

We don't want our Provincial School Grants Cut Off

The Province can't make us build a NEW school, but the Department of Education is unlikely to support us with money for half-measures. They know we need a NEW school. Georgetown Births Total Ninety-One Last Year

Birth statistics compiled for 1949 by Halton Health Unit showed 91 babies born to parents resident in the town. Forty two were born in Brampton, 36 in Guelph; 7, Toronto; 3, Milton; 2, Hamilton.

Esqueing Township records 79 births, most of them occurring in Brampton 27, and Guelph, 25. Fifteen were born in Milton; 5 Acton; 2, Hamilton, one, Toronto and four within the township.

It is not possible to obtain a one hundred per cent accurate record of births in the county. Statistics collected showed a total of 912 births, which is a birth rate of 26.6 per thousand population. (The county population is 34,300.)
