### JERSEY QUALIFIES FOR SILVER & GOLD CERTIFICATES

Among the many Jersey records that have recently been completed in Halton County the leader is Norval Royal Beulah, owned by Lloyd Crichton, Georgetown. Beulah went on test as a senior 4 yr. old and in 305 days qualified for both silver and gold medal certificates with a record of 12,854 lbs. of milk and 647 lbs. of fat.

In the herd of Hans Krois, Oakville, another daughter-of-his-former herd sire, Sissy's Golden Standard, has completed a record. This time it is Belvin St. Anita with a junior 3 yr. old record in 305 days of 7,459 lbs. of milk, 480 lbs. of fat. Sissy's Golden Standard is now owned by the Hamilton District Cattle Breeders' Association and is being used artificially. He is one of the high rated sires of production in Canada.

Other sows have qualified in the herds of Miss Susanne Cochenour at Waterdown; Maurice C. Beaty at Milton; Denny Charles, Georgetown and Kenneth Ellis at Hornby.
