BOARD MEMBER EXPLAINS SCHOOL COST DEBENTURES

Georgetown, Ont., June 1st, 1950

Dear Mr. Editor:
The question of finances for a new Public School seems to have been causing some concern. Perhaps a few lines would clarify the matter.

It has been estimated that a new school of sufficient size to fill out foreseen future requirements, will cost approximately \$190,000. If the Province contributes a percentage of the cost, why should there be need for Georgetown to issue debentures for the full amount? The answer is, that the responsibility for providing a new school is the Town's. The Province does not donate a lump sum toward the cost, but rather contributes its share each year toward the debenture repayments.

It is indeed fortunate that debentures which have been costing \$13,700 annually on the old water-works system and on wartime housing, will be paid off before the school debenture annual repayment of \$13,368 begin. And toward the latter figure the Province will make its contribution.

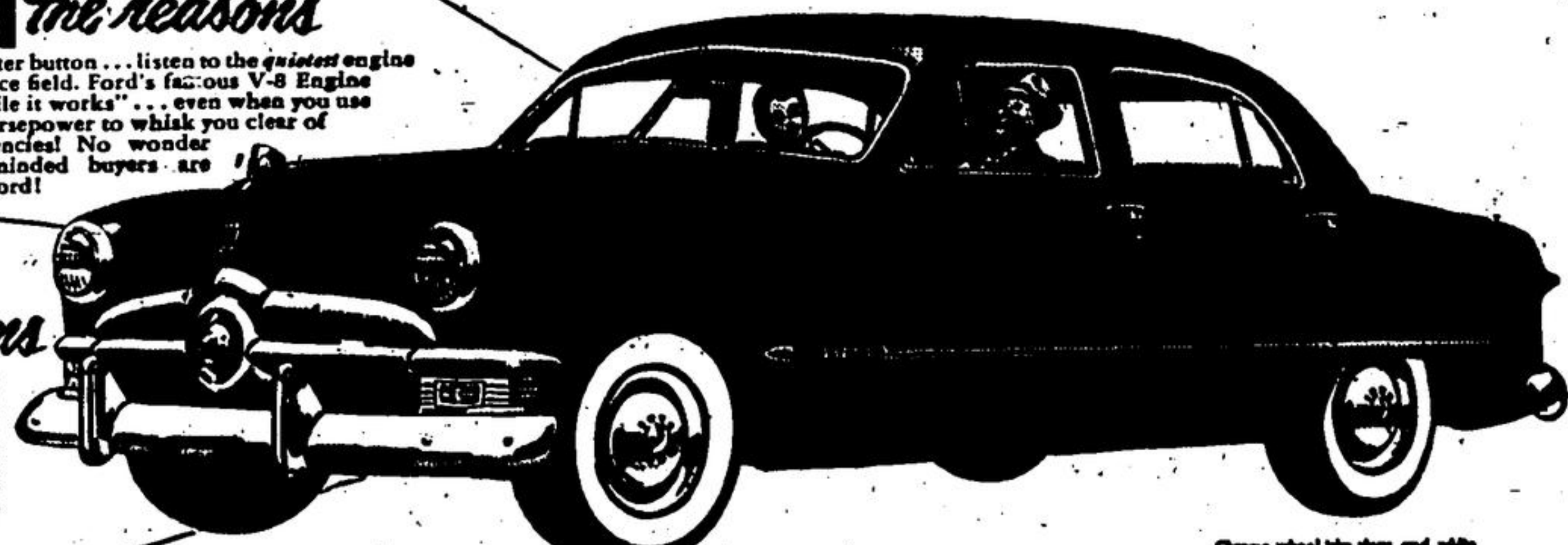
