Corporation of the Town of
 Georgetown
By-Law No. 50-7
 A By-Law authorizing the borrowing of \$190,000.00 upon debentures for the erection of a six room public school.
 WHEREAS the Public School Board has requisitioned the Council of the said Corporation to borrow for the purpose of erecting a new public school containing six classrooms and an assembly hall at the present school is inadequate for our public school population and the new school is necessary in addition to the present school, a sum not exceeding \$190,000.00 upon the credit of the Corporation to issue debentures therefor bearing interest at the rate of three and one-half per centum (3 1/2%) per annum, payable annually, and to provide for the discount and the expenses incidental to negotiation and sale of said debentures.
 AND WHEREAS it is expedient to make the principal of the said debt repayable in annual instalments during the period of twenty years next after the date of issue of such debentures, of such amounts respectively that, with the interest in respect of the debt, the aggregate amount payable for principal and interest in each year shall be as nearly as possible the same; subject to the statutory proviso that each instalment of principal may be for an even \$100.00, \$500.00 or \$1,000.00, or multiple thereof, and, that notwithstanding anything herein contained, the annual instalments of principal and interest may differ in amount sufficiently to admit thereof.
 AND WHEREAS the amount of the whole rateable property of the municipality, according to the last revised assessment roll thereof, is \$1,537,510.00.
 AND WHEREAS the amount of the existing debenture debt of the Corporation, exclusive of local improvement debts secured by special rates or assessments, is \$540,899.00 and no part of the principal or interest of such debt is in arrear.
 AND WHEREAS by Order dated the day of 1950 the Ontario Municipal Board has approved the purpose of the said borrowing and the passing of all requisite by-laws, including debenture by-laws.
THEREFORE THE COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF GEORGETOWN ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:
 1. For the purpose aforesaid the Corporation shall borrow upon the credit of the Corporation a sum not exceeding One Hundred and Ninety Thousand Dollars (\$190,000) and shall issue debentures therefor in sums of not less than \$50.00 each. Each debenture shall bear interest at the rate of three and one-half per centum (3 1/2%) per annum, payable annually, and shall have coupons attached thereto for the payment of such interest.
 2. All the debentures shall bear the same date, shall be issued at one time and within two years after the day on which this by-law is passed, may bear any date within such two years and shall be made payable in annual instalments during the period of twenty years, next after the date of issue thereof, and the respective amounts of principal and interest payable in each of such years shall be the amounts so designated in Schedule "A" hereto annexed.
 3. The debentures shall be payable as to both principal and interest in lawful money of Canada and may be made payable at such

For Halton Farmers
DON HOLMES WINS JUNIOR FARMER CHAMPIONSHIP TROPY
 Seventy two Halton Junior Farmers competed for the Championship Trip to the 4-H Club Congress at Chicago. The award is based on the high aggregate score for the two judging competitions held in March and June, and, in addition the winner must have coached a team of junior lads over a definite number of livestock classes. The March competition was held in conjunction with the County Seed Fair and Bacon Show, when the young men judged classes of grain, small seeds, potatoes, hog carcasses, and identified mounded weeds and large plants. As announced in last week's column on Saturday, June 3rd the 72 young men judged

a total of ten classes in all — two each of dairy cattle; beef cattle, heavy horses, sheep and swine. When everything was taken into consideration, Don Holmes, of Trafalgar Township, was the top competitor and next winter will represent Halton at the big get-together of juniors from all parts of the continent, when they meet in Chicago at the time of the International Livestock Show.
 The runner-up was Jack Marchment, also of Trafalgar Township, who thereby wins the Kingsway Kiwanis Special of a Short Course at the OAC next winter. This competitor was also awarded the Duncan Campbell Trophy emblematic of the beef cattle championship.
 Don Holmes was also the winner of the Palermo Junior Farmer Trophy as coach of the winning junior team, composed of John W. Pickett, John Willmott, and Grant Stark. The second prize team was coached by Geo. Pelletterio third prize team by Jack Marchment, and fourth by Mac Sprowl.
 Fraser McNabb, of Esquesing Township, was the champion judge of the two competitions, and thereby won the Norval Junior Farmers Challenge Trophy. The same competitor won the Donald Robertson Trophy emblematic of the high competitor in heavy horses. Ward Brownridge of Esquesing, demonstrated that he is still the champion livestock judge, having the high score in livestock, and topping all less than three of the five sections. He was awarded the Baronsston Trophy emblematic of the championship in Dairy Cattle. Herb Wilson, of Norval Juniors, was awarded the Mason Knitting Co. Trophy for sheep judging, while Wm. Brain, of Milton Juniors, won the Thos. Blacklock Trophy for Swine judging.
 Norval Juniors demonstrated that when it came to judging they still have the Club to beat, winning the Bank of Nova Scotia Trophy for Esquesing Township with their livestock team of Ward Brownridge, Fraser McNabb, and Stuart Alexander; and the Dr. R. K. Anderson Trophy for the Club with the six high competitors on the aggregate score of the two competitions. Their representatives were Fraser McNabb, Geo. Wilson, John Currie, Howson Ruddell, Floyd Bridgen and Gordon Bird.
 The High Novice of the day was Geo. Rozister, of the Palermo Club, who thereby wins the CNE Shield.
 The top prize winners in the three divisions of the livestock competition were as follows:
 Junior Division, 16 yrs. and under: Geo. Rozister, Barry Archer, John Willmott, Donald Campbell, Craig Featherstone, Gordon Bird, Grant Stark and Finlay Currie, tied; and Robert Joyce and Norman Bird, tied.
 Intermediate Division 17 to 21 yrs. inclusive: Lloyd Vivian, Stuart Alexander, Sandy Buchanan, John Currie, Herb Wilson, John Pickett and Don Milton, tied; Keith Moore, Colin Marshall, Howson Ruddell and Don Joyce, tied.
 Senior Division (22 yrs. and over): Ward Brownridge, Fraser McNabb, Geo. Pelletterio, Bill Brain and Geo. Wilson, tied; Grant Norrish, Mac Sprowl, Gordon Darby.



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place, or places, in Canada as shall be designated thereon.
 4. The said debentures shall be sealed with the seal of the Corporation and signed by the head of the Council or by some other person authorized by by-law to sign the same, and by the Treasurer. The said interest coupons shall be signed by the Treasurer and his signature thereon may be written, stamped, lithographed, or engraved.
 5. Commencing in the year 1952 and thereafter in each year in which an instalment of principal of the said debt and interest becomes due, the Corporation shall levy and raise the specific sum shown for the respective year in the fourth column of the said schedule. Such sum shall be levied and raised by a special rate sufficient therefor, over and above all other rates, upon all the rateable property in the municipality.
 6. The said debentures may contain a clause providing for the registration thereof pursuant to Section 336 of The Municipal Act.
 7. Pending the sale of the said debentures, the head of the Council and the Treasurer may raise for the purposes aforesaid by way of loan on such debentures any sum, or sums, of money not exceeding in all, the sum hereby authorized to be borrowed and may hypothecate such debentures for such loan.
 8. The Corporation shall have the right, at its option to redeem the debentures of this issue which mature in the year 1972 on any interest payment date prior to maturity at the places where and in the moneys in which the said debentures are expressed to be payable, upon payment of the principal amount thereof together with interest accrued to the date of redemption and upon giving previous notice of said intention to redeem by advertising once in the Ontario Gazette and once in a daily newspaper of general provincial circulation, published in the City of Toronto, and once in a local newspaper, such notice to be advertised as aforesaid at least thirty days before the date fixed for redemption. Notice of intention so to redeem shall also be sent by post at least thirty days prior to the date set for such redemption to each person in whose name a debenture so to be redeemed is registered at the address shown in the Debenture Registry Book.
 9. READ a first and second time this 21st day of May, A.D. 1950.
