**D.C.W. Pottery is
Town's Newest Industry**

Georgetown's newest industry, D.C.W. Pottery, which started as a hobby last November has grown to include four full-time employees and two part-time and is already planning to expand its quarters. George Duke, who is in charge of production, and Bill Cumpsty, who handles business and sales, first started making lamp bases and china penny banks for private sale. Soon the demand was more than they could fill with spare time work and they gave up their positions to devote all their efforts to the new products. Working the first three months in a cellar, the company was soon in need of more space and moved into part of the Snyder Transport building on Young Street. By July 1st this will be expanded to take in the back half of the building also. Several new products are planned for production by the end of July.

A variety of semi-porcelain and marbled ware is manufactured, including lamps, ash trays, souvenirs, art pottery, flower pots and vases. A popular item for which there seems no limit to the demand is a large tray bank. Three products in one is a china ornament which, by painting in different designs is a squirrel, racoon or rabbit. Present employees are Jim Blair, Jr. and Danny Mossop. It is hoped that the business will grow and that it will give opportunity for more employment for the people of Georgetown.

**AT ESQUESING COUNCIL
ON MONDAY, JUNE 14**

Council decided to all attend a meeting in Milton with North Halton High School Board and representatives of other municipalities to discuss a different sharing of costs of operating the three high schools in the districts, other than on the present equalized assessment. The school board has suggested that the 1950 levy be based on the new assessment and that estimates be submitted by municipalities which had not completed the new assessment, with adjustments to be made next year when the actual figures are known.
