Mrs. W. H. Barth was of Pioneer Erin Family

As a result of injuries suffered when she was struck by a car in London a week earlier, Mrs. W. H. Barth died in Victoria Hospital, in London on June 4th. Her family was at her bedside. Mrs. Barth was in excellent health up to the time of the accident and had been visiting her daughter-in-law, Mrs. Lloyd Barth, who was seriously ill in the hospital at the time. She died last Sunday.

The former Isabella Roszel, who was in her 85th year, was born on November 23rd, 1865, and was one of five children of the late Stephen Roszel and Maxine Cooper. Her father was one of twelve sons of Nathaniel Roszel, the first white settler in Erin Township, who settled on a section of land which is now Lot 1 between concessions 6 and 7. Of Pennsylvania Dutch origin, he came to the district early in 1800. His son, Benjamin, was the first white child born in Erin County.

Predeceased by three sisters and one other Mrs. Barth was the 10th remaining member of her family. She received her education at Blue Mountain School and Peacock School and trained as a dressmaker at Anderson's Dry Good Store in Brampton which was located on the site of the present Dominion Bank. Later she had her own dressmaking establishment in Morrison, where she met and married the late Henry Barth in March, 1894. They lived on the Barth homestead until 1901 when they moved to the Roszel homestead at Ballinafad. In 1912 they bought a farm at Glen Williams where she had since made her home.

She was predeceased by her husband eight months ago and leaves a family of four sons, Gordon of Vancouver, B.C., Stanley of Fort William, Cecil of Glen Williams and Lloyd of London. There are five grandchildren, one granddaughter having died three months ago.

Rev. Alex Cowan of Glen Williams United Church conducted the funeral service in that church where she had long been a faithful member. She taught in the Sunday School for 25 years and was an elder for a number of years after church-union. He was assisted by Mrs. Barth's nephew, Rev. H. Rokeby-Thomas, rector of Christ Church, Port Stanley. Pallbearers were neighbours John Hancock, Wes Rutledge, John Eason, Archie Eccles, Alvin Starré and Albert Presswood. Interment was made in the family plot in Glen Williams Cemetery.
