**PRESENTATIONS MADE TO PUBLIC SCHOOL TEACHERS**

A banquet and presentation in St. John's Church Hall last Wednesday honoured two members of the public school staff, Misses Hazel Harrison and May Langan who retire this week after teaching here for over forty years. Miss Harrison received a wrist watch and Miss Langan a radio from the school board and both were given electric kettles from fellow members of the staff.

School board chairman Edwin Wilson was chairman for a program which followed the serving of a turkey dinner by the 56-59 Club of the church. He read letters from Miss Anne Ryan, Miss Gebrina Young and Mr. Will Hume, expressing their regret at not being able to attend and asked P. B. Harrison, school board treasurer, to introduce all those present.

Mr. Wilson, in congratulating the teachers on their fine record of service, compared school conditions of the past with those of the present. In 1897, a teacher was receiving \$230 a year and in 1910 salaries ranged from \$350 to \$400. The caretaker was paid 50c a day in 1897 and 80c a day in 1910. Total cost paid by the town in 1910 for operating the school was \$3750. Last year, the town's share was \$20,500. When the last four room addition was made, the cost per room was \$1600. Nowadays, the estimated cost per room is \$20,000.

J. M. Denyes, a former school inspector, said that it was people like these teachers who made history, for it is the public school teacher who plays a large part in directing the minds of the citizens of the future. The present inspector, L. L. Skuce sketched the progress of education from the one room school to the schools of the present.

Mayor Harold Cleave expressed the gratitude of the town at having two such fine people giving service for such a long period and Principal Howard Wrigglesworth said how much their experience would be missed by staff and students. P. B. Harrison, who is Miss Harrison's brother, and whose father was once principal of the school said that the earliest school which could be traced in Georgetown was conducted by a Mr. Van Allen in his home and later in the Town Hall. The nucleus of the present building began when four rooms were constructed in 1869, to which later additions have been made.

Ross Duncan, a member of the school board spoke on behalf of the board of their regret at terminating such fine records of service as both teachers have earned. Mrs. Walter Biehn and Mrs. Harry Shortill, both former pupils, made the presentations for the board and Misses Beatrice Hume and Marie Lindsay of the school staff presented the presents from the teachers. During the evening Miss Marion Hepburn sang two solos and Mrs.

James F. Evans played a piano solo.

**Kelmscott Farms Largest Canadian Yorkshire Breeders**

It will be recalled that E. L. Taylor of Kelmscott Farms, Milton, imported a complete Breeding Unit of English Yorkshire swine, comprising seven gilts and three boars. Arriving at Quebec on Monday are a further seven gilts purchased on a buying trip to England this spring and next month two more females will arrive, making a total of sixteen English Yorkshire breeding females. In addition to these there are twelve Canadian Yorkshire sows now on the farm and these are now producing progeny sired by the English boars.

One of the herd sires is the son of the Breed Champion English Royal Show, York 1948 and another is the litter brother to two selected by the Danish Government last year for their Livestock Improvement Program.

Among the gilts arriving on the "Salacia" on Monday are two which are in-pig to the son of the Supreme Breed Champion English Bath and West Show at the end of last month. The Bath and West is second only to the English "Royal" in importance. One of the other gilts is in-pig to the new "wonder-bear" Harlston Royal Glen and another to one of the best young boars ever known in English Yorkshire circles, Ardencote Champion Turk 11th. An exceptional gilt, Moonraker Saddle 38th, arriving with the shipment, is full sister to the 1st Prize winner in the livestock class at the 1949 Smithfield Show and from the same dam as the Whitley and Harris Challenge Cops in the Bacon Carcass Class in the same show.

The first pure-bred English litters which have been farrowed at Kelmscott are showing up extremely well and are full of 'type'. Gains are satisfactory as is indicated by the first litter which weighed an average of 49.5 lbs. for eight pigs

at eight weeks, out of a litter of nine born from a first farrowing.

In order to obtain the experience attention necessary, the herdsman, Ken Capindale, flew over from England six weeks ago and he is now in charge of operations, Ken was formerly herdsman to the largest Yorkshire breeding establishment in Britain and he obviously knows and understands the breed intimately. Nearly eighty breeding sows were kept and they had between 1000 and 1500 pigs.

So that satisfactory farrowing quarters be available, Kelmscott has completed a farrowing house with twelve pens, with rubber-composition flooring, infra-red heating of the creeps, glass-insulated walls and thermostatically controlled ventilation.

The arrival of the new gilts makes Kelmscott Farms the largest English Yorkshire breeders in Canada and orders are now being received for stock from Vancouver to Quebec and it is anticipated that the lively interest which is being shown in Kelmscott animals from U.S. breeders will result in a brisk export trade.

Young boars will shortly be available, either pure English or English-Canadian cross and the latter can be sold to breeders not wishing to pay an excessive figure, at prices which will prove economical. Eventually, it is intended to dispose of all stock other than pure English Yorkshire as it is the aim so concentrate entirely on this breed. An interesting point is that all pure and cross-bred English Canadian Yorkshire stock can be registered with Canadian National Livestock Records as Yorkshires.

Mr. Taylor purchased Kelmscott Farms from Lloyd Davison last year after selling his Massey-Harris farm machinery agency here to Doug Swackhamer of Brampton.
