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Early Herald Tells of Laying of a Corner Stone for St. Alban's Church

On the occasion of the 47th anniversary of St. Alban's Church of England, Glen Williams, which was celebrated last Sunday, an item is reprinted from the September 10, 1902, issue of the Herald telling of the laying of the corner stone for the building, when a number of high Masonic officials were present. The item follows:

Judge Harding, Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of A.F. & A.M. of Canada, Officials — A Large Concourse of Masons and Citizens — The Glen Handsomely Decorated.

Glen Williams was in holiday attire on Monday. It was the occasion of the laying of the corner stone of the new Anglican Chapel and all the factories were closed down in honor of the occasion. The village was also very handsomely decorated for the event. Evergreens were much in evidence, while flags were everywhere. The street from the village hall to the chapel was many times crossed with suitably coloured bunting, while the business places were also prettily decorated.

Meeting of Grand Lodge
 The corner stone was laid by the Masonic Grand Lodge of Canada, M.W. His Honor Judge John E. Harding of Lindsay, Grand Master, performing the ceremony.

The local arrangements were in charge of Credit Lodge, Georgetown, and the building committee of the Chapel of St. Alban. The lodge was called together in the lodge room, Georgetown, by W. Bro. R. C. McCullough promptly at 1.30. The lodge donned their regalia and marched to the station where they met the Grand Master and other brethren of the Grand Lodge at the 2.10 train. Here carriages were in waiting and all went at once to the Glen where Grand Lodge was called together in the village hall. Laying The Corner Stone
 The Lodge organized a procession was at once formed, and headed by the Glen band the Lodge marched to the new building, where a great crowd of interested people had congregated.

As the Grand Lodge and Clergy took their places on the platform the school children led in the singing of the 100th Psalm, immediately after which Rev. T. G. Wallace stepped forward and read the following address:
 To the M.W. his Honour Judge John E. Harding, Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of Canada in Ontario.
 Most Wor. Sir and Brother:
 On an occasion so important to the spiritual and moral life of our community as the laying of the corner stone of St. Alban's Chapel,

Glen Williams, an edifice about to be devoted to the worship of the Almighty Ruler of the Universe, it affords us great pleasure to have with us today to perform the ceremony, you, M.W. Sir, the chief Head and Ruler of the Craft of Ancient Free and Accepted Masons in Ontario, assisted by so many eminent members of the fraternity and dignitaries of the church.

We are heartily thankful for the honor shown us this day and unite with yours, our ziggere prayers that this material stone now laid, may be symbolical of a corner stone of God's truth and righteousness now and hereafter to be laid in the heart and soul of each one of us here assembled, or who shall hereafter render thanks to The Most High for His bountiful favours so freely vouchsafed to mankind. On that sure foundation may a superstructure arise against which the storms of life may beat in vain, so that through the stress may emerge a church sound and stable and souls pure and unsullied.

As a testimony whereof we sign at Glen Williams on this 8th day of Sept. A.L. 5902 and A.D. 1902, on behalf of Credit Lodge No. 219 A.F. & A.M., Georgetown, Ontario.

In reply Judge Harding expressed his pleasure at being permitted to summon Grand Lodge for the purpose of laying the corner stone of an edifice to be devoted to the worship of the Great Architect of the Universe. He was pleased to be able to say that no man could become a Mason unless he believed in God, and it was a privilege to lay the corner stones of churches whose true foundation was He in whom we have life and being. He was glad to pay a visit to the prosperous little village of Glen Williams and he hoped the church would grow so rapidly that it would soon have to be enlarged.

W. Bro. A. S. Forster of Oakville, then read the scroll which was deposited in a cavity in the corner stone. It contained the names of the Earl of Minto, Governor General of Canada; Sir Oliver Mowat, Lieut. Governor of Ontario; Premier Laurier, Premier Ross, Rev. John Philip, Bishop of Niagara; H. W. Cook, Warden of Halton; Thomas G. Wallace, Rector; the officers of St. Alban's Chapel; John Harding G.M., AF AM, W. H. Robinson, DDGM; D. Henderson M.P.; John R. Barber M.P.; R. C. McCullough W.M. of Credit Lodge, and the names of the building committee.

At this point Mr. John Sykes presented a silver trowel to Judge Harding, which bore the following inscription:

Presented to His Honor Judge John E. Harding, W.M. Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Canada, A.F. & A.M., on laying the Corner Stone of St. Alban's Church, Glen Williams, 8th Sept., 1902.

The stone was then put in place and, upon Judge Harding's instructions, S. Beaumont applied the plumb rule, W. H. McFadden the level and W. H. McFadden the square. Judge Harding then pronounced the stone well laid, truly laid, well proved true and trusted. The inscription on the stone was: "This corner stone was laid by the Grand Lodge of Canada A.F. & A.M., Sept. 8th, 1902. M.W. His Honor Judge E. Harding, Grand Master."

In the faith of Jesus Christ we lay the Corner Stone, in the name of God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Ghost. Amen. O God, without whom nothing is strong, nothing is holy, sanctify and build up these walls to thy honour and glory. Let the light of thy hold presence ever shine upon them. And may thy Holy Church, built upon the foundation of the Apostles and Prophets, Jesus Christ himself being the chief cornerstone, fitly framed together, and compacted by that which every joint supplieth, grow unto an Holy Temple in the Lord. Amen.

O Lord, who wisely orderest all things, both in heaven and earth; to thy merciful protection we commend the workmen employed in this building. Let thy fatherly hand ever be over them; keep them from all evil, accident, hurt or hindrance, and from all unfaithful, profane, or unholy words or deeds; that the work now begun, may by thy blessing on their labour, be brought to a happy end; through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Prevent us O Lord, in all our doings with thy most gracious favour, and further us with thy continual help; that in all our works begun, continued, and ended in thee, we may glorify thy holy name, and finally by thy mercy obtain everlasting life; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The band then played and all joined in the singing of "The Church's One Foundation is Jesus Christ her Lord."

Some Brief Addresses

Judge Harding then spoke briefly to the assembled audience. He said that the Masonic order was one of the most beneficent societies existing among men. It looks to the up-building of the human race. It is a thoroughly democratic society, each member being the equal of any other member of the craft. When King Edward was Grand Master he was on just the same footing as any of his brethren. The glory of the order was that it cared for the widow and the orphan, and no Mason need want for the necessities of life so long as he has a Masonic brother. In closing, His Honor thanked the Rector, and all the Brethren who had helped to make the ceremony a success.

Mr. R. C. McCullough, W.M. of Credit Lodge, congratulated St. Alban's Mission upon the favourable weather for this important ceremony which had been so successfully performed by His Honor

Judge Harding and cordially thanked the Masonic brethren and the people in the neighbourhood for their presence.

After some further complimentary remarks by Rev. W. L. Armitage, Rural Dean Belt and Mr. W. H. Robinson, D.D.G.M., the proceedings closed with the benediction and the National Anthem.

A Garden Party

At the close of the ceremony, a garden party was held on the beautiful grounds of Mr. S. Beaumont. The ladies had prepared a magnificent array of tables spread in the most attractive fashion with an abundance of good things, and as the Band, under the efficient direction of Mr. Lindley Beaumont, played sweet music and the graphophone sang songs or made comic speeches, the company proceeded to show the ladies that they fully appreciated their generosity.

Building Committee and Officers

Since the erection of the chapel was first proposed, up to the present there has not been a single note of discord among the members of the committee in charge, all having in view the best interests and success of the undertaking. This has proven a source of gratification to all concerned. The members of the building committee are — Rev. T. G. Wallace, chairman; John Sykes, W. J. Armstrong, Jos. Beaumont, Secretary; H. Holdroyd, treasurer.

The present church officers are: H. Holdroyd, People's Warden; W. C. Armstrong, Rector's Warden; Jos. Beaumont, Sunday School Superintendent; L. Rutledge, Librarian; Woman's Auxiliary: Mrs. Sykes, President; Mrs. Jos. Beaumont, Vice President; Mrs. Clark, Secretary; Mrs. Holdroyd, Treasurer.

The ladies have given most valuable assistance in connection with the building, and the energy and devotion they have displayed cannot be too highly commended.

Dimensions, Cost, Etc.

The church building is of stone. It is 35 feet by 72, completed with vestry, vestibules, etc. The interior will be finished in choicest pine. The seating will be the latest design of open pews in oak or ash. The building throughout will be lighted by electricity. The estimated cost of the property complete is \$3,500. The seating will be provided at the outset for 150 people, but the auditorium will accommodate 200. The plans were prepared by Messrs. Gouinlock & Baker of Toronto who have given the best of satisfaction. The contractors are Messrs. Steele & Hume of Georgetown.

The Orange Lodge will present the Mission with a Bible. A window will be put in, in memory of the late Mrs. McMaster. It is expected that the building will be completed by November.
