## NEW INDUSTRY NOW LOCATED IN GEORGETOWN

### What Council Did

ON MONDAY, JULY 3rd

Would not accept the proposed cost figures for Georgetown's share in the high school district this year and instructed the clerk to write the board that council considered them unfair.

The question of sharing costs has been a contentious one this year. Requiring has claimed that they are paying too much and has threatened to let the matter go to arbitration. On the present equalized assessment basis, which Esquering is contesting, Georgetown would pay \$4850. On the proposed basis, which is based on a new equalized assessment agreed to at a recent county council meeting and which will be in effect in 1951, Georgetown would pay \$7650. This is \$2800 over the year's budget estimate of \$7000.

At the last school board meeting a motion to appoint a board of arbitration was made, with the proviso that if signed agreements from the five municipalities concerned were received within 15 days, the motion would be shelved. Kenneth Dick, of Milton, solicitor for the board, appeared at the meeting to discuss the question with council.

Will make an agreement with Cedarvale School paying charges of \$150 yearly for a private fire protection line, on the presumption that Georgetown's new municipal well has interfered with the school water supply.

Deputized Cr. Harry Hale to interview Alliance Paper Mill officials to ask what is being done about correcting the mill waste situation along Papermill Road. Stan Allen appeared at council to ask if council had any further information.

A letter from the County Health Unit advised that the new dump on property on Main Street South next to the disposal plan was undesirable. Property owners had objected and the health unit felt that if dumping were continued it would become unsightly. If the site were to be used further, a sanitary fill system should be adopted.

(The new dump was used a short time but has now been abandoned and the former dump is once again being used.)

Asked the Dept. of Highways to resurface No. 7 Highway through town where necessary.

Received an enquiry from the St. Regis Paper Company saying they were considering a plant in the Hamilton district and wanted to obtain 50,000 square feet floor space or 4 acres of land to construct a building. The company operates mills at Dryden and Three Rivers and produces Kraft paper bags. The new factory would employ 70 women and 30 men.

Council wrote, giving details of the town, and offered to send a delegation to Montreal to interview company officials.

Mayor Cleave reported that he had been told on Friday by Mr. Ackerman of Toronto, that he had purchased the old paper mill building from Provincial Paper, Ltd., and would be establishing a new industry here.

A letter from Provincial Police headquarters advised that next year replacements would not be provided for officers who were on vacation, due to a shortage in staff.

Gave third reading to a by-law to borrow \$100,000 for the construction of a new public school.

Will repair the 9th Line hill, the 9th Line in front of L. E. Fleck's residence and Queen Street beside Scott Motors. Estimate figures are \$80 for Queen Street, \$60 for Fleck and \$760 for the hill.

(Moved by Marshall and MacDonald.)

Will offer Jack Toet \$400 and Leon Cook \$250 for sewerage damage to their properties, providing assessments are granted.

(Moved by Hill and Marshall)

Contacted sewerage engineer C. E. Harty to discuss extensions to the present system which are contemplated.
