The project was designed to raise money for parks at the two wartime housing developments and about \$300 was netted from the show.

A cast of 65 appeared in the eleven acts which comprised the revue. E. V. MacCormack and Mrs. Joe Emmerson played starring roles as a young couple who wanted to get married but couldn't fit a date and each month they chose introduced the various acts. Marion Hepburn was musical accompanist and one of the highlight numbers was the Don McNeill Breakfast show based on the popular radio program. Don Barrager played Don McNeill, Mrs. Harold Hutchinson, Aunt Fanny and Mrs. Leslie Tomlinson and Holly Dwyer vocalists. Mrs. William Bullivant and Mrs. William Emmerson received corsages from the Norton Floral for being the longest married ladies in the audience.

Another radio show "Take It or Leave It" featured Hal Newman as Eddie Cantor. Andy Crichton won two silver dollars plus the ten dollar jackpot the first night with Mrs. Albert Hills and Victory Majurey also winning silver dollars. Contestants the second night were Jack Hepburn, Muriel Spence and Jackie Jennings, the latter winning the jackpot.

A college scene featured club president J. L. Lambert as Mr. Gott Rock, president of the Alumnae Association, while in a Christmas scene, Ern Hyde was Santa Claus, Mrs. Vern McCumber Mrs. Santa and Peter Darlington Santa Jr. The opening scene in a telephone office had Marion Stuart and Pauline Tyers playing the leading roles. Gertrude Cain Fry did a tap dance specialty.

Labor Daze, with six young men completely outfitted as ladies drew the biggest laugh in the show. The chorus included Ross Norton, Vince Jones, Jack and Stewart Young, Lorne McBride and Bill Berry.
