**Eighteen Years M.P.,
Dr. R. K. Anderson Dies**

Progressive Conservative member of parliament at Ottawa from 1917 to 1935, Dr. R. K. Anderson of Milton died in Hamilton General Hospital on July 3rd, in his 91st year. Dr. Anderson was first elected in 1917 as member for Halton and won elections again in 1921, 1925, 1926 and 1930. He retired from political life in 1935. After graduation from the University of Toronto in 1888 and after post-graduate study in Edinburgh, New York and Chicago he practiced medicine in Milton for forty years. Prior to seeking federal office he was a councillor and mayor of Milton and chairman of the Milton Hydro Commission. Mrs. Anderson predeceased her husband three years ago and one daughter, Miss Marjorie Anderson survives. The funeral service was held in Grace Church of England on Thursday with a Masonic service at the graveside in Evergreen Cemetery.

WITH THE ANGLERS

Usually this time of year trout fishing in this locality is poor and this year is no exception. Distant places are the best places for fly rod enthusiasts right now, not only for trout but for bass, pickerel and pike. Taking these fish on a fly rod is sport deluxe. Bright coloured streamers and backtails are the best for these fish.

Places to Fish

Williams Lake and Bell's Lake this side of Chatsworth on the Owen Sound highway are good bets for the bait fisherman. Worms and minnows are very productive. There are 14 boats at Williams Lake, but at Bell's one has to have his own boat. For fly fishermen we would recommend Eugenia. The shad fly hatch should be at its peak right now. De-spairs work very well in the daytime while at dusk a crane or devil bug is productive. The last two if properly used imitate a snail trying to rise out of the water. The Beaver River, which empties into the lake at Eugenia is a very good spot also if one finds a fairly open pool for casting. All waters mentioned above contain only trout.

Lucky Anglers

Jack Harrison repeated with another 2 lb. brown recently. Clarence Tucker and the Writer took some nice speckled trout from Williams Lake. They averaged 1 lb. each.

Warry Mann, Fred Spires of town and Fred Brown of Brampton journeyed to Percy Boom over the week end and had good luck. The catch consisted of ten pike, from 20 to 26 inches and 9 small mouth black bass 11 to 16 inches. Most of the bass were taken on a yellow and black streamer tied by the writer.

Jerry Hepburn, Jim Carney, Cliff McDonald and Tom Doyle were at Cloyne recently and caught some good pike and bass in Lake Mazinaw. The bass were returned to the water as it was closed season at the time.

The boys also went to Loon Lake but owing to a cold wind and voracious mosquitoes no fishing was done. Boats and motors can be rented there and the lake has a good reputation for bass and pike. Other more isolated lakes provide wonderful bass, pike and muskie fishing, but the boys recommend a guide for these places.
