Thanks Flood Fund Supporters, Campaign Closes on July 15th.

Winnipeg, Man., July 7th, 1950

The Editor, Georgetown Herald, Georgetown, Ont.

Dear Mr. Biehn:

On May 28th, we wired you seeking your co-operation in connection with the Manitoba Flood Relief Fund. At that time the Red River flood was at its height and many thousands of residents of the Red River Valley area had been driven from their homes. The flood waters have now receded and business life of the community is back to normal. As a result of the generous help given by the weekly newspapers of Canada in support of the Fund, along with the assistance given by the press and radio of Canada and some thousands of local committees which have been giving their energetic help to the Fund, we now have received contributions of more than \$6,500,000 in cash and goods to the value of several hundreds of thousands of dollars, which goods have been directed to the Red Cross and Salvation Army for distribution to flood victims.

The generous contributions made to the Fund will enable us to carry out our objective of fully compensating flood victims for loss of furniture, home furnishings and personal belongings destroyed or damaged by the flood waters. Approximately 1,000,000 persons have contributed to the Fund. These contributions have ranged from 25c up to \$380,000 received from the Line Elevator Companies and the grain trade.

The Manitoba Flood Relief Committee has decided to bring the campaign to a close on July 15th. In ending the campaign the Committee and the flood victims whose homes will be restored by the Fund, wish to express to the Georgetown Herald deep appreciation for all that you have done in enabling the Fund to reach its objective. They also ask that through your columns they be permitted to convey their heartfelt thanks to the citizens of your district who have contributed so generously and to those who have worked so diligently in local efforts on behalf of the Fund.

We feel that the contributors to the Fund will be interested in knowing that the raising of the Fund was accomplished entirely with voluntary help. As a result of all connected with the Fund hav-

ing contributed their time and efforts, the cost of raising this large sum of money will be less than 1% of one per cent of the amount collected. We believe that this constitutes a low cost record in the raising of such a large fund.

We would appreciate it if, through your columns you request that any local committees operating on behalf of the Fund forward any contributions on hand as soon as possible after the closing date of the campaign.

TOM GARD'S NOTE BOOK

Half the joy of having a garden is having a comfortable chair in a shady nook where you can lounge and enjoy the changing beauty of your surroundings. What's the use of having a garden if you can't take time to sit down and enjoy it? These are the days when the home owner should be able to recline comfortably on a lawn seat in the dense shade of a towering maple... not one task to be done... not a care in the world... sounds like Utopia!

Garden Seats

My own siestas take place in a secluded corner of the garden, well hidden from the surrounding neighbourhood. One of my prize possessions is a garden bench I made last year. True, it isn't the most comfortable piece of furniture in the world, but it is sturdy and wasn't too hard to make—as you can see from the sketch. My pride and joy is the wide bench I built around the trunk of the maple that stands to one side of the patio. It took a bit of fitting to give an attractive natural finish but it has attracted more favourable comment than any other piece of garden furniture I have made.

Garden Pools

If you are like me, you'll have a bird bath and a small pool in clear view to help you relax. Nothing is quite as restful and cooling as the sound of running water and the reflection of blue sky in a still pool. The size of the pool doesn't matter—you'll get the same effect from a small birder wheel set in concrete (mentioned last month), a wash tub sunk in the ground or an extensive cement job. When properly planned and planted so that it fits naturally into its surroundings, the size or expense of the pool is immaterial.

Bird Baths

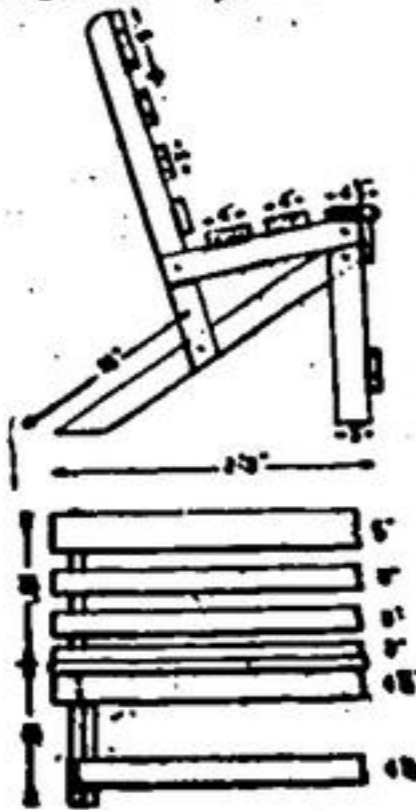
I could watch my bird bath for hours if work would permit. On a warm afternoon there is a steady procession of bluebirds, chipping sparrows, wrens, song sparrows and robins. The birds do not care how expensive the bath was. As long as the water is fresh, clean and not too deep, they will use it regularly. Between the two extremes illustrated are a host of styles and designs.



POOLS

MADE OF CONCRETE — MIXED 3 OF SAND TO 1 OF CONCRETE — AND AT LEAST 6" THICK. INSIDE DEPTH SHOULD PERMIT 6" OF WATER OVER THE CROWN OF THE LILIES.

SHOWN IS CROSS SECTION OF SIMPLEST TYPE — THREE LAYERS OF CONCRETE ON UNIFORM BOULDERS EMBEDDED IN SOIL.



GARDEN SEATS

1" PINE, DRESSED ALL SIDES. BACK REST AND SLATS — OF VARIOUS WIDTHS. SCREW NAILS BEST FOR JOINING PIECES. SHELLAC ALL KNOTS AND GIVE SEAT TWO COATS OF OUTDOOR PAINT. CHAIR WIDTH APPROX. 20" BENCH ABOUT 42".



STOOL FOR VERANDAH
