North Halton High School Board favours building one central school to replace the three present schools operated at Georgetown, Acton and The severe thunderstorm on Milton. At a meeting in Milton above the lowest ever recorded for val of the building of a new school somewhere between Speyride and -Ern Batkin Georgetown.

Cost figures/have been compiled which show that a school to serve the present district would cost \$525,000 fully equipped. A seventy per cent grant is available on the bulk of this expenditure.

A proper school would contain 8 classrooms, gymnasium, library, cafeteria and special rooms for commercial, chemistry, home economics and agriculture. Eighteen teachers would be employed in place of the present staff of 24 at the three schools. The saving in teachers' salaries would offset an estimated net increase of \$5000 in transporta-
