

I read with interest the article: "Shortage of Nurses", It may be of interest to the readers, to note. qualified nurses from England are not allowed to go into nursing serified M.D. is not allowed to prac-; periment conducted by a professor tice until he has done two year masseur, must do at least nine months, so the shortage is due to the laws of Ontario.

The writer has written articles on all subjects of medicine and was 16 years masseur in England, 12 yrs, chiropodist and 4 years in hospital in the RAF, treating over 2,000 Canadian airmen at the Base Hospital, Marston Moor, Yorkshire, England. He is not allowed by Ontario law to treat them here. He is not allowed to treat them free of charge. He must go to Toronto for 9 months, at a fee of \$350, plus \$15 registration fee, plus \$10 examination fee to secure a licence costing \$15. It may be of interest to note 500 chiropodists are required and masseurs in Toronto area alone, also the masseur here, and the chiropractor are rushed off their feet, so whilst an appeal is raised, for one of the lowest paid, and thankless jobs in medicalism, the Law is not interested in suffering humanity or its administrators of health.
