Bob Goldham, Chicago Black Hawks defence star, is one of nine players involved in the biggest trade in the history of the National Hockey League. Bob will go to Detroit this season to play with the Red Wings, his third major league team, since he first made the big time with Toronto Maple Leafs.

Bob, who is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Goldham of town, learned his hockey here and with Toronto Marlboros and was a sensational success as a rookie with the Leafs when he was nicknamed "Golden Boy" by city sports columnists. He returned to the Leafs after serving with the navy during the war, and was sent to Chicago in a seven player deal in November, 1947.

Detroit, champions of the NHL and winners of the Stanley Cup last season, turned over to the Hawks goalie Harry Lumley, defencemen Jack Stewart and Al Dewsbury, left winger Pete Babando and centre Don Morrison. In exchange they get centre Metro Prystal, left winger, Gaye Stewart, goalie Jim Henry and Goldham.

OBJECTS TO REGULATIONS FOR CHIROPODISTS, MASSEURS

Dear Sir:

I read with interest the article: "Shortage of Nurses". It may be of interest to the readers, to note, qualified nurses from England are not allowed to go into nursing service in Ontario, without first taking a six months course here. Qualified M.D. is not allowed to practice until he has done two year course here, a dentist, chiroprapist, masseur, must do at least nine months, so the shortage is due to the laws of Ontario.

The writer has written articles on all subjects of medicine and was 16 years masseur in England, 12 yrs. chiroprapist and 4 years in hospital in the R.A.F. treating over 2,000 Canadian airmen at the Base Hospital, Mar-ton Moor, Yorkshire, England. He is not allowed by Ontario law to treat them here. He is not allowed to treat them free of charge. He must go to Toronto for 9 months, at a fee of \$350, plus \$15 registration fee, plus \$10 examination fee to secure a licence costing \$15. It may be of interest to note 500 chiroprapists are required and masseurs in Toronto area alone, also the masseur here, and the chiroprapist are rushed off their feet, so whilst an appeal is raised, for one of the lowest paid, and thankless jobs in medicalism, the Law is not interested in suffering humanity or its administrators of health.
