The forum feels that Ontario farmers are paying too high a price for western grain and wants speculation on the grain exchange replaced by a more stable system which will benefit farmers in both sections of the Dominion.

At present there is a spread of 62c a bushel between what the western producer receives and the Ontario consumer pays and forum members feel that this is out of line.
