Led Bible Class Here S. F. Howard Dies

Remembered in town as founder of the Argonaut Bible Class which he conducted during his residence in town, Stanley F. Howard died suddenly last Wednesday at his summer home at Barry's Bay.

Born in England sixty years ago, Mr. Howard came to Canada in 1911 and took employment in Montreal with the Bank of Montreal. He organized his first Bible class in that city and had similar classes in Ottawa, Oshawa, London, Georgetown, Holstein, and St. Thomas. While in Georgetown in the early 20's he was accountant at the bank branch and lived at the home of Mrs. William Whyte on Maple Avenue. He conducted his Bible class at the then-Methodist church. Last year members of former classes in different towns gathered in Toronto for a testimonial dinner in his honour and several from town attended.

When he was transferred to head office staff in Toronto thirteen years ago Mr. Howard once again started an Argonaut class at Eglinton United Church. Unmarried, he is survived by a brother and sister in London, England.

The funeral service was held on Friday at the Trull Funeral Home and interment was made in Mount Pleasant Cemetery.
