the soviet regime under the cloak of repatriation. Like the people in the first wave, they took what employment was offered, and now find themselves denied care and protection in Germany.

As you have seen previously, thousands of persons were soundered up by the Germans in cinemas, theatres and churches and were forcibly brought to Germany for work. They formed the third wave, and the remainder who poured into Germany when the victorious Red army was again on the doorstep of their countries made up the fourth.

### LABOUR MINISTER DIES



Hon. Humphrey Mitchell, 55, Federal Minister of Labour, died last week in Ottawa. A native of Old Shoreham, Sussex, England, he came to Canada in 1912 and served with the Royal Navy during the first war.

After the war he settled in Hamilton and followed the trade of electrical operator, taking a prominent part in the labour movement in that city. He was secretary of Hamilton. Local of the IBEW, secretary and president of Hamilton District Trades and Labour Council, a Hamilton alderman and was first elected to parliament in 1931. He assumed the post of Minister of Labour in 1941 after the retirement of Hon. Norman McLarty.

### LIONS VOTE SUPPORT TO 1951 S.A.H. CAMP

A strong supporter of the Stay-at-Home Camp since its inception last year, Georgetown Lions Club voted at a meeting last week to spend at least \$400 next year on a similar project.

Ex-Lion president J. L. Lambert was one of the prime movers of the two week camp which was inaugurated in 1949 and which has been very successful. This year the Lions Club paid \$400 of the \$750 cost of running the camp.

At the meeting a report compiled by Edwin Wilson was read, in which an investigation committee headed by Mr. Wilson had examined the possibility of building a swimming pool in Georgetown. It was the opinion of the committee that it would be difficult if not impossible to finance a \$40,000 project locally unless at least half of the cost could be contributed by industries or wealthy individuals. No final decision was made on the matter.
