What Council Did

ON MONDAY, AUGUST 14th

Will hold a plebiscite at the December election on the question "Are you in favor of organized recreation with an annual grant of \$2500 to Georgetown Recreation Commission?"

Received an application from a Toronto man who said that he had read in the Telegram that Georgetown intended to hire their own police chief and he wished to apply for the job. No action was taken on the letter.

Reeve Marshall reported a broken drain near Lyla Armstrong's residence and said this would be fixed. I. M. Bennett complained that his garage entranceway had been closed since sewers were installed and that surface water from Church Street drained into the garage. This was turned over to the foreman.

A letter from S. W. Orr complained that streets in his subdivision were in bad condition, particularly Market Street, which is not accessible from Maple Avenue. Water from Charles Street, he said, was causing erosion on some of his building lots.

Deputy Reeve MacDonald said that it was impossible to keep the culvert open on Main Street below the Orr property because so much soil is being washed down and a 2 foot galvanized pipe is being installed to clear up this situation.

Accepted the proposal extended by Esquesing Township that Esquesing accept 50 per cent of the amount levied on Georgetown by North Halton High School District for 1950 in excess of \$7000, up to an amount of \$7856.

Accepted the tender of William Robinson and Sons, Guelph, for installing a sidewalk from Kay's Grocery to Normandy Boulevard at a cost of 30c per square foot.

The Robinson tender was one of three received. Cr. Hale asked for a recorded vote and voted against the motion, all others voting in favour.

Cr. Hale said that he and Cr. Tuck had tabled a motion at the June meeting for an increase in pay and it had been postponed until the finance committee made a report. Mayor Cleave said that the chairman of finance, Cr. McGilvray, was on holidays and it was difficult to make a decision at this meeting. Town foreman Hyde pointed out that some of the work done by the men this year comes under debentures and is not included in the regular budget. Reeve Marshall said there was no doubt that basic wage rates in town are high, but he was worried about how much money the taxpayer can afford to spend. Crs. Tuck and Hale both said they thought town employees should have more pay. Mayor Cleave said he was in sympathy with the men, though he didn't know where extra money was to come from.

Will put a street light on Edith Street in front of James Richardson's new home.

Reviewed estimates by engineer C. R. Hagey of \$33,392 for proposed extensions to the sewerage system. The figure is compiled as follows:

The latter three are in the Orr subdivision. Mr. Hagey recommended that all the work be done under the supervision of the town foreman who had done a good job on Sarah Street in a similar project. Estimated cost of sewerage extension is \$1.68 a foot.

A decision on what will be done will be made at the next meeting.

John Cummins asked about sewerage service to the new house he is building near the public school and the engineer will be consulted about this.

Will pay \$50 expenses for three delegates from the fire brigade to attend the convention in Woodbridge on August 19th.

Fire Chief Harry Savings said that repairs were necessary to the doors at the fire hall before next winter.

Endorsed the 1951 county equalization by-law passed by county council at a meeting a few months ago.

Oakville Vet Making Food Control Study

A provincial grant to Halton Health Unit to initiate a new program in food control has been announced. Dr. William Mitchell of Oakville began this work early last month and will have as his responsibility the over-all supervision of animal food supplies in the county. He will be assisted by the present staff of sanitary inspectors.

Dr. Mitchell is concentrating on one major problem at a time. He has begun an intensive control program on mastitis in dairy herds. The laboratory work is being done by the Ontario Veterinary College, Guelph. He is planning further work in the fields of meat supplies, Bang's Disease in cattle and educational programs for food handlers.

A bomber pilot in World War 2, Dr. Mitchell was shot down over Germany, was a prisoner of war and was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross. He is a graduate of the Ontario Veterinary College, Guelph and holds a diploma in veterinary public health from the School of Hygiene, University of Toronto.

The veterinary project is completely financed by a federal grant received through the provincial government. Halton is one of a selected number of areas in the province which is being used for research in this field of public health.

Was Conservative M.P.P. In Saskatchewan Riding

Conservative member of the Saskatchewan parliament for a five year term in the '30's, Nathaniel Given died last Tuesday in Guelph General Hospital following a stroke which he suffered a few weeks previously.

Mr. Given was born near Ballinacraf and was a son of the late John Given and Mary Ann Kirkwood. He went west as a young man, first settling in Indian Head, Sask., and later at Milestone, Sask. He secured employment with the Case Company in Winnipeg and was later transferred by the company to their branch at Saskatoon. He purchased a hardware business at Delisle, Sask., and it was during his residence there that he was elected a member of parliament representing Rosetown constituency.

Returning to Ontario, Mr. Given operated a grist mill at Creemore for two years, then moved to Toronto and last year returned to this district where with his wife he lived in an apartment at the home of Mrs. J. McDougall.

He was a member of the Orange Lodge and the Oddfellows and belonged to the United Church.

The funeral service on Thursday at the McClure Funeral Home was conducted by Rev. Alex Calder and Rev. T. J. Rees of Elora, a family friend during his residence in the west. Pallbearers were John Bingham, Kyle Bingham, H. E. Ostrander, Thomas Given, Jack McMenemy and Robert Given of Waterloo. Interment was made in Greenwood Cemetery, Georgetown.

Mr. Given is survived by his wife, formerly Christine Buttrey, one sister, Mrs. N. Hardie of Toronto and four brothers, Jack of Ballinacraf, Robert of Georgetown, Mark of Rockwood and Malcolm of Delisle, Sask.

Guelph Contractor W.J. Binnie Dies

Wilfred John Binnie, well-known in town where he had often done contract work in excavating, died Monday in Guelph General Hospital. He was 42 years old. At the time of his death his firm was employed by the town in putting a water main into the Cedarvale School property.

Mr. Binnie was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Alex Binnie of Ballinacraf. He is survived by two sisters, Mrs. P. Arnett (Ethel) of Guelph and Mrs. Norman Adamson (Nora) of Streetsville.

The funeral service was held this afternoon at the McLanaghan and Ross Funeral Home, Guelph and interment was made in Woodlawn Cemetery, Guelph.

Drowns At Huttonville After Fall From Dam

Falling from the top of a dam spillway in the Credit River at Huttonville, an 11-year-old Norval district boy drowned Monday in nearly 30 feet of water. He was Lorne Frederick Hall, only son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Hall, lot 7, 4th line west, Chinguacousy.

The boy was playing with a friend, Johnny Noble, 9 when he toppled 20 feet down the sloping surface of the dam into the river. Johnny's frantic screams for help brought Lionel Walwork, Chinguacousy, to the scene who dived fully clothed into the river and brought the lad to the surface.

Provincial Constable Douglas Struke and Fire Chief Matt Gowland of Brampton applied artificial respiration before coroner Dr. W. H. Brydon pronounced the youngster dead. An inquest has been ordered.

Besides his parents, he is survived by a sister Norma. The funeral service was held this afternoon at the funeral home of the Brampton Funeral Service, and interment was made in Brampton Cemetery.

High School Results
