### Lost Recovered, Five Arrests in Peel Robberies

A routine check of a suspicious looking truck in Brampton on August 22 led to an investigation by Brampton and Provincial police which has solved three break-ins, in Brampton and Peel County, uncovered loot valued at several thousands of dollars, and resulted in five men being charged with break-ins and robbery.

Nothing was taken from the truck, loaded with household articles, on Brampton Main Street at five a.m. on August 22. Constable Robert Ritchie questioned two men and relayed the information to Provincial Constable Douglas Strickland, that morning.

Articles in the truck, closely resembling loot from the home of George Henry Calderon, Township, which was looted for the two men, and on August 8th the goods were found in a farmhouse near Home and two men arrested.

With the finding of a stove and refrigerator, belonging to S. Steinberg, Camp Navvek, in Owen Sound and Acton, two Brampton men were arrested. The next step led to the recovery of a valuable rug and other articles stolen from the home of C. V. Charters, Brampton, in a cottage at Hawkstone and the arrest of a third Brampton man.

### SELLS PHOTO STUDIO SAILS FOR ENGLAND

Albert Simson, who has conducted a photography business on Main Street for the past few years has sold his business to Noel Reynolds. Mr. Simson sailed for England last week on the Samaria and intends to spend some time there and possibly may visit Australia and New Zealand later on. It is his third trip abroad. He was touring Europe by cycle at the outbreak of the last war and returned to England from Italy and sailed home on one of the last passenger runs in 1939. He later enlisted in the Canadian Army and served overseas during the war. Always interested in photography, he established a studio upstairs in the O'Neill Block and this year moved across the street to a room above the Rose Bar Restaurant.

### West Montrose Holstein Sets World Milk Record

The usual statement accompanying a world record to the effect that "the cow received the same care as the rest of the herd" is taken with a grain of salt by veteran dairymen, but here is a case where the animal not only did not receive special care, but her owner didn't realize that she was making a

world record until it was drawn to his attention after the test had been completed. The cow in question is the purebred Holstein Dorothy Mercedes Lee Snow and her owner is Abner B. Martin, West Montrose, Ont. "Dorothy" has finished a 305 day record as a senior two-year-old on twice-a-day milkings of 16,707 lbs. milk containing 635 lbs. fat, average test 3.80 per cent butterfat, which is the largest fat record ever recorded for a Holstein heifer anywhere in the world in this class. It is also the fourth largest milk record ever reported in this class in Canada. Continued on test until her next freshening, "Dorothy" made a yearly record of 18,663 lbs. milk containing 716 lbs. fat that stands tenth for fat for Canada in its class.

"Dorothy" was bred by Emmanuel W. Gerber, Millbank, Ontario, and was sold as a calf to Malcolm Davidson, Newton, Ont. It was at the dispersal sale of the latter's herd that Mr. Martin bought her. He had not intended to be a buyer but was attracted by Dorothy's pronounced dairy characteristics. She is a big heifer, with exceptional width of muzzle, deep very open in the rib, has a good udder and heavy veining.

At the time she was purchased by Mr. Martin, Dorothy had completed the first five months of her record. It was while in the Davidson herd that her best day's production of 70 lbs. was made. Mr. Martin says: "On her arrival at my farm, she aggregated the other cows (and ourselves) by her continuous bawling. Her production dropped from a before the sale figure of 45 lbs. a day to 28 lbs. Then she started slipping into the barn at noon with one of the other cows that was being milked 3 times daily and to keep her from bawling we gave her a noontime dish of chop. She soon settled down, discontinued her bawling and was adopted by the rest of the herd. Her production started to go up and within a month she was milking 36 lbs. a day."

To qualify for the 305 day division, Dorothy freshened at 18 days less than a year from the start of her record. She did not miss a milking and has continued her exceptional production as a three-year-old, having given a total of
