Stockholders Union Asks Referendum on R'ymen Hours, Wages

In a letter to Prime Minister St. Laurent last week, the American Stockholders' Union, of which Mr. Thomas Sutton of Limehouse is president, asked for a referendum of company shareholders, in this case the people of Canada, on the question of granting changes in hours and wages to employees of the Canadian National Railways.

Mr. Sutton, in his letter, said that railway, union leadership itself was, in great part, responsible for the high wage rates and short hours!

now obtaining in industry... "The plea for a high wageshort work week in industry made by railway union leadership was based on the increased tempo of industrial production," the letter continued. "A similar increased tempo does not prevail in rail operations and railway union demand for a 40 hour week is backed solely by the selfish desire of railway workers. We cannot admit a right of rallway workers to enjoy a short work week unless and until farmers, independent business men, doctors, etc., are enabled to benefit

from a similar privilege." The petition maked that a referendum be taken for or against a 40 hour week for CNR employees and that employees refusing to report for duty until the result of such a referendum is known should be dismissed from service forthwith.
