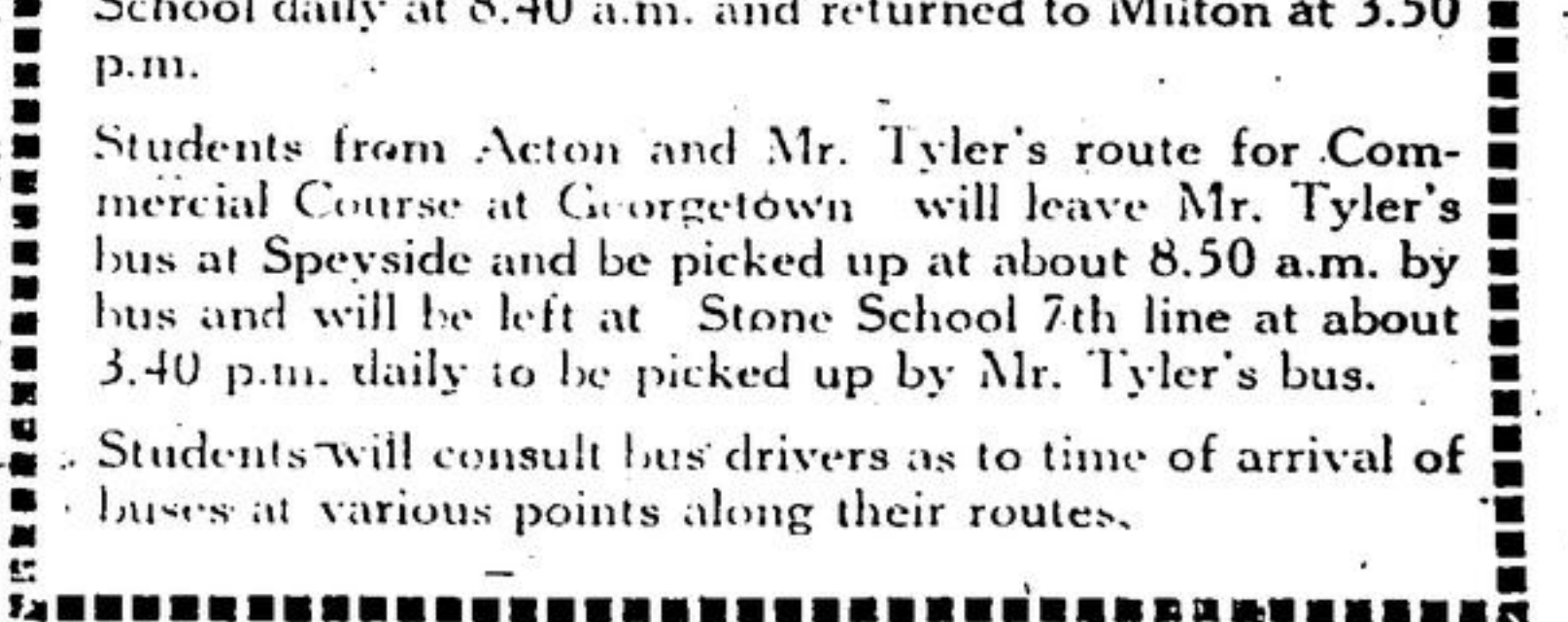
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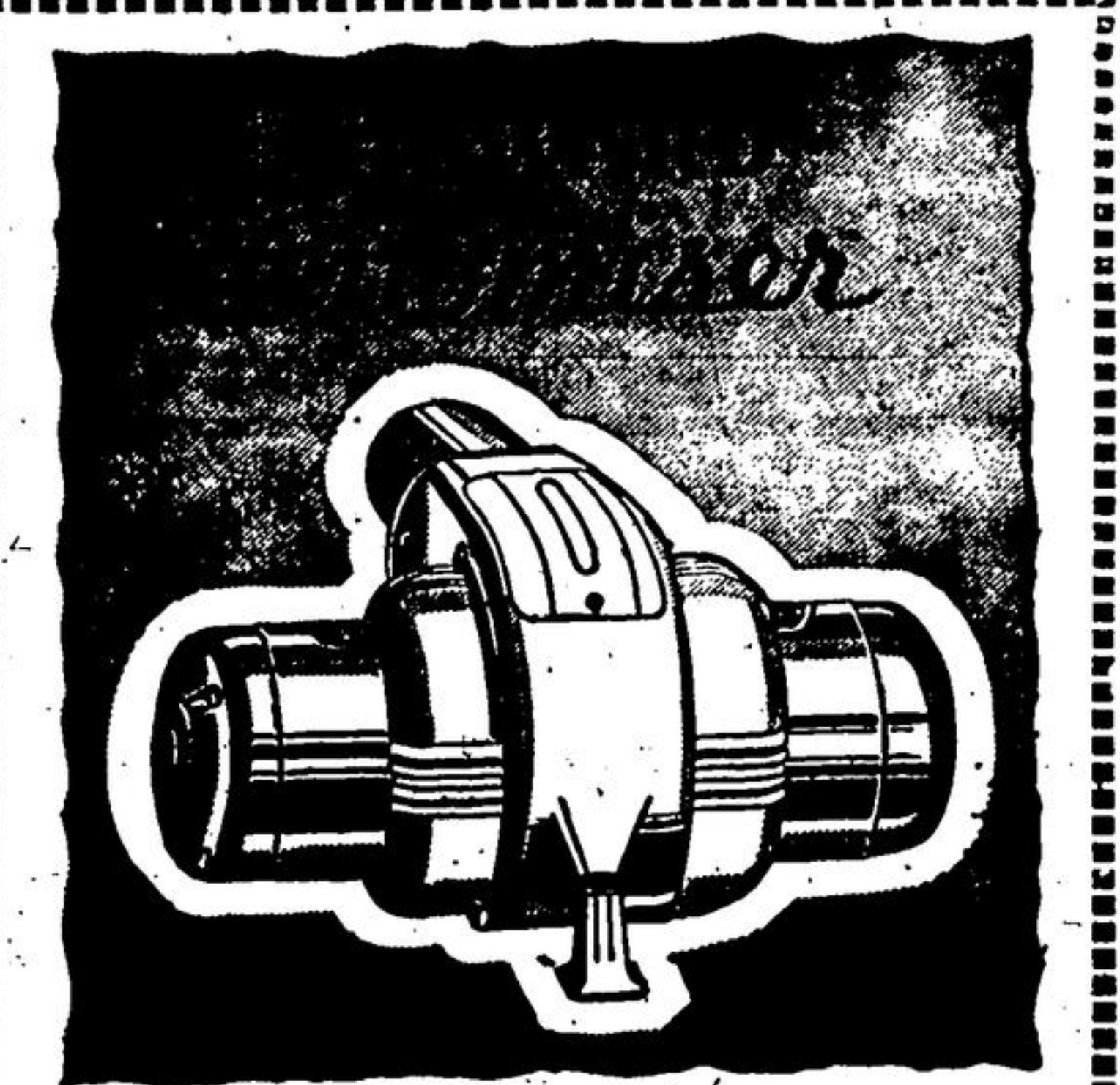

 (Mr. Poole's bus)
 Milton via 2nd line to Speyside, to Stewarttown, to Ashgrove; No. 10 sideroad to 9th line, to base line, to 7th line (Hornby), up 7th line to No. 5 sideroad, to 3rd line, thence to Milton. (Same route after school).
East Esqueing to Milton —
 Georgetown to Norval to Wnaley's corners, thence to Milton via baseline. (Route reversed after school.)
 Seven grade 9 students from Norval will be picked up by taxi at Norval Public School at 8.40 a.m. and taken to Georgetown High School.
To Acton High School — (Mr. Tyler's bus)
 Route east of Acton as formerly. West of Acton—No. 7-Highway to Guelph line, Guelph line to No. 20 sideroad Nassagaweya Twp. to 4th line to No. 15 sideroad to Speyside, to Acton via 2nd line.
Nassagaweya Twp. route to Milton High School —
 (Mr. Ingles' bus)
 Campbellville north on Guelph line to No. 20 sideroad; No. 20 sideroad to 1st line, to Nelson-Nassagaweya baseline, and continue as formerly to Milton.
Glen Williams and Terra Cotta —
 Students to Georgetown High School by bus as formerly.
 Acton and Georgetown-High School students to Milton for Shop Practice and Home Economics as formerly.
 Students from Milton and Milton buses for Commercial Course at Georgetown will be picked up at Milton High School daily at 8.40 a.m. and returned to Milton at 3.50 p.m.
 Students from Acton and Mr. Tyler's route for Commercial Course at Georgetown will leave Mr. Tyler's bus at Speyside and be picked up at about 8.50 a.m. by bus and will be left at Stone School 7th line at about 3.40 p.m. daily to be picked up by Mr. Tyler's bus.
