### Lorne Scots Band Win at C. N. E.

Georgetown's Lorne Scots Band were in their usual good form on Thursday last, and once again brought honour to themselves and the town by placing first in the band contest at the Canadian National Exhibition.

Only two bands were in the competition this year, a third band failing to put in an appearance at the contest. The Lorne Scots scored 266 1/2 points, quite in excess of the Port Colborne Band which rated 255 points. The Georgetown band had 28 members in the contest piece, Port Colborne 35 players.

Individual band members also distinguished themselves, winning gold medals. In the cornet class Victor Carter took top honours and Fred Lee made the same win in the euphonium class.

Adjudicators were Captains Atkins and Scott, of Kneller Hall.

A number of local citizens took in the Ex last Thursday and were on hand to congratulate the band on their excellent achievement.

### Former Station Agent Thomas S. Hill Passed Away at Lucan

CNR station agent at Georgetown from 1930 to 1937, Thomas S. Hill died on August 30th at the home of his son Thomas S. Hill, Jr., Lucan, where he had been residing for the past six months.

Mr. Hill had been connected with the railway since 1892 and spent most of his time as station agent at Granston, where he served for 29 years.

The late Mr. Hill, who was in his 79th year, was born in Hamilton. He was married to Catherine Burwell who predeceased him a few years ago.

Surviving are four sons, Norman of Georgetown; Wilfred W. of Niagara Falls; Thomas S. Lucan; and William H., Brantford. One brother also survives, William E. Hill of Hamilton.

The funeral service on Saturday afternoon was conducted by the Rev. Alex Calder and the pallbearers were William Burwell, Jack and Alister Parkhill, Hamilton; William Peer, Toronto; Clarence Buck, Beamsville, and Clare Robinson, Burford. Interment took place in Greenwood Cemetery, Georgetown.

### Brother of Mrs. McGowan Died at Kitchener

Brother of Mrs. W. A. McGowan of town, Dr. Frank R. Harvey, F.A.C.S., died in St. Mary's Hospital, Kitchener, on August 29th.

Born at Arthur, he was the son of Mr. and Mrs. John T. Harvey. After graduating from the School of Medicine at the University of Toronto he did post-graduate work in New York City. During the first war he served in France as a member of the Royal Canadian Army Medical Corps.

He practiced in Saskatchewan and Edmonton and in 1920 established a practice in Kitchener. He was a member of the North Waterloo Medical Society and of the Ontario and Canadian medical associations. A member of the Masonic Lodge, Dr. Harvey belonged to the Westmount Golf and Country Club and was past president of the Granite Curling Club. He attended Trinity United Church, Kitchener.

He leaves his wife, the former Maisie Robson, a daughter Barbara Ann and two sons, James M. and Frank, Jr. His eldest son John F. was killed in action in 1942. He also leaves one sister, Mrs. W. A. McGowan (Ullah) of Georgetown and two brothers, William of Pasqua, Saskatchewan and Dr. Miln C. of Kitchener.

## Glen Fair Will Be Saturday's Big Event

On Saturday next, September 9th, St. Alban's Ladies' Guild will present Glen Williams fourth annual fair. While this fair started in a very small way it has gained considerable momentum and this year's show promises to be bigger and better than ever.

The fair has outgrown its original building and is now held on the Lacrosse grounds, with a large marquee housing the exhibits. A full prize list was circulated some time ago, and exhibits of home baking, handicraft, school children's work and vegetables will be on display. To this list a Hobby class has been added; No. 41 for men; No. 42 for ladies. Also a special prize of \$1.00 given for the best pumpkin.

Feature attractions will be ball games (teams entered: Smith and Stong, Limehouse, Businessmen and Glen), pony rides and races for the children, and the usual baby show. Prizes are offered for the person coming the longest distance to the fair; to the youngest and oldest at the fair; and for the mystery man. An old time fiddler's contest, open to anyone, and with no entry fee, should attract a large entry.

The Lorne Scots Regiment are parading, and a midway and refreshment booths will round out an afternoon of fun and enjoyment.

It is hoped district people will turn out in large numbers so that the efforts of these enterprising ladies may be well rewarded.

In the big tent on the grounds the Guthrie baby show will be held as usual with classes for all ages and good prizes.

### NORVAL OUST BRANTFORD IN INTERMEDIATE LACROSSE

Norval Intermediate lacrosse team ousted Brantford three games to one in the group play offs and earned the right to continue for group leadership.

In the game at Brantford last Friday night Norval won by a 12-7 score. It was a big night for the Norval team, and especially Clark Lyons who scored three goals and returned in a grand game -- to return home in the wee hours of the morning where he found his wife had presented him with a lovely baby girl.
