What Halton Farmers Will Be Interested In At Georgetown Fair

Continuing a policy set up last year, the 1950 Live Stock Show at the Georgetown Fall Fair will again be confined to Halton County showmen only. This means that the "gentleman farmer" with his professional stock will be barred from competition and the honest to goodness dirt farmer of the county will be given a chance to vie with his neighbour. This system moved a step forward last year, and Georgetown fair looks forward to still further improvement in the livestock section this year. There are classes for all five dairy breeds and every farmer has the opportunity of showing.

Something new, and of interest to the junior farmers is the Commercial Dairy "Calf" Prize, totaling over \$100.00, are offered in this class, in addition to a Bulova watch given by the Bank of Commerce for showmanship. The fair board is confident that at least fifty calves will be shown in this class, and considerable publicity has been given to this project throughout the county.

Holstein breeders will be happy to know that besides the regular prize money offered by the agricultural society, the Halton Holstein Club are paying \$1.00 per head for each animal shown. In addition to this the Royal Bank silver tray will be donated for the best Holstein herd as well as a cash prize of \$10.00 donated by the fair president.

Besides the regular classes for swine, the T. Eaton Co. are offering \$30.00 in cash prizes, plus \$15.00 Society funds, for bacon hogs of the desired weight and finish. Farmers with hogs ready for market should consider this special as not only are the prizes worthwhile but the best market price for the hogs is available from the packing houses.

While there is little change in the sheep classes they offer probably the best prize list of any local fair. Better than ever this year will be the poultry lawn show, with many new exhibitors expected to bring their birds here.

It is hoped that the Norval Junior Farmers will reestablish the free brain show they sponsored a few years back, and from all indications they are working on this project. This exhibit drew many favorable comments and the public are looking forward to the juniors putting the show back on its former level.
