Sybil Bennett Speaks on Citizenship to W.I.

At the September meeting of the Georgetown Women's Institute held at the home of Mrs. E. S. Thompson, Guolph Street, on Wednesday evening, September 6th; Miss Sybil M. Bennett, B.A., K.C., National President of the Conservative Women of Canada, delighted over forty members, friends and visitors with a talk on Citizenship.
Taking her audience back to ancient history where the title of citizen had to be deserved and earned, and to Biblical days when St. Paul held prestige because he was a Roman citizen, she compared their being born into Canadian citizenship and their privileges. She asked them to ask themselves these questions: What do we owe to Canada? What are we going to do about it? What are we going to give our country instead of what is it going to give us?

Miss Bennett has recently travelled from coast to coast and gave a very vivid description of our heritage. The Institute roll-call for the month was "Why I am proud to be a Canadian citizen." Unfortunately this preceded Miss Bennett's talk for the answers would have been very different and more interesting afterward. Mrs. W. V. Grant introduced Miss Bennett and said the women of Georgetown were proud of Miss Bennett and her achievements and people of Halton were glad to call her a native. After such a wonderful talk Canada would be glad to call her a citizen. Mrs. E. Gowland moved a hearty vote of thanks to Miss Bennett, hostess, convener and committee.
