Town of Georgetown

TAKE NOTICE THAT:
1. The Council of the Corporation of the Town of Georgetown intends to construct as a Local Improvement sewers in the Town of Georgetown as an extension of the existing system, which will be undertaken, as a local improvement and intends to specially assess a part of the cost upon the land abutting directly on the work. The land particularly affected is set out in Schedule "A".
2. The estimated cost of the sewerage extension is \$35,000.00 of which \$16,906.00 is to be paid by the Corporation. The estimated cost per foot frontage is \$1.68. The special assessment is to be paid in twenty annual instalments.
3. A petition to the said Council will not avail to prevent its construction, but a petition against the work or the manner in which it has been undertaken may be made pursuant to section 10 of the Local Improvement Act, to the Ontario Municipal Board by a majority of the owners representing at least one-half of the value of the lots which are to be specially assessed therefor.
4. A by-law for undertaking the work has been considered by the Council at a meeting thereof held on the 11th day of September, 1950. Dated at Georgetown, Ontario, this 11th day of September, 1950.

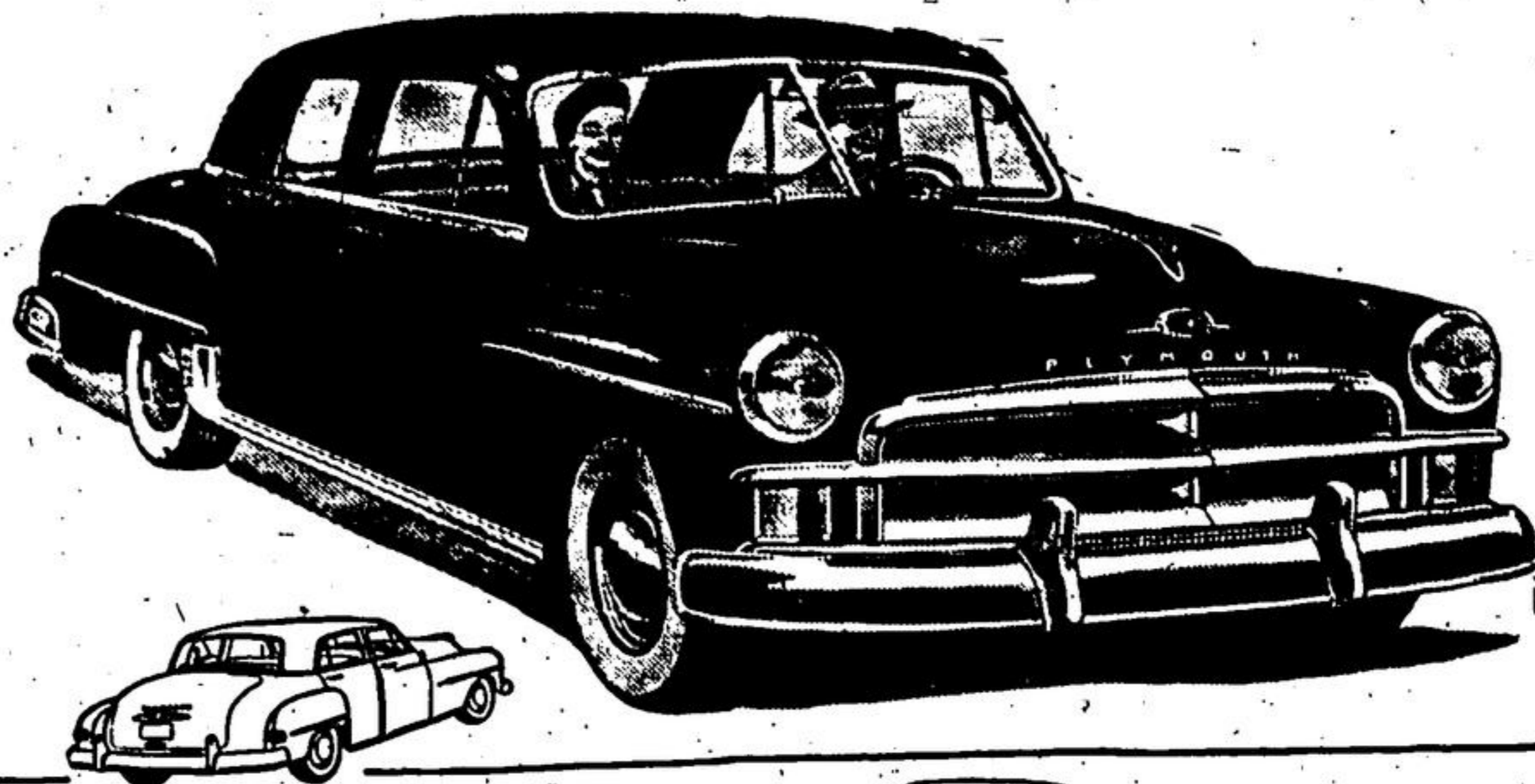
