

Suggest Three Boards Discuss School Problem

Appearing at last week's meeting of North Halton High School District board, Mr. Colling, a member of Burlington-Nelson school board expressed the opinion that boards of North Halton, Burlington-Nelson and Oakville-Trafalgar should get together and attempt a solution of the confusion which exists between districts.

There is quite a problem at present centering around Milton. Geographic location makes it sensible to send a certain number of Trafalgar and Nelson Township pupils to the Milton High School. Instead of this they are transported, some from as far away as seventeen miles to schools in the lakeshore towns.

Originally the consultative committee which first examined the question of creating high school districts, recommended dividing the townships for school purposes. Unfortunately the two districts in the south were established first. When transportation was introduced for half the townships public opinion soon brought transportation for all township children. By the time North Halton district was created the damage had been done, Burlington and Oakville had embarked on building projects to which the two townships were committed to share the expense. And Oakville and Burlington buses were picking up students on Milton's doorstep to transport them miles away for their education.

Some board members on Monday expressed an interest in a joint meeting but felt that it was not up to the North Halton board to make the first move. Mr. Colling was given assurance that if any meeting takes place the North Halton board will be represented.

GHS GRADUATE NOW TORONTO ARCHITECT

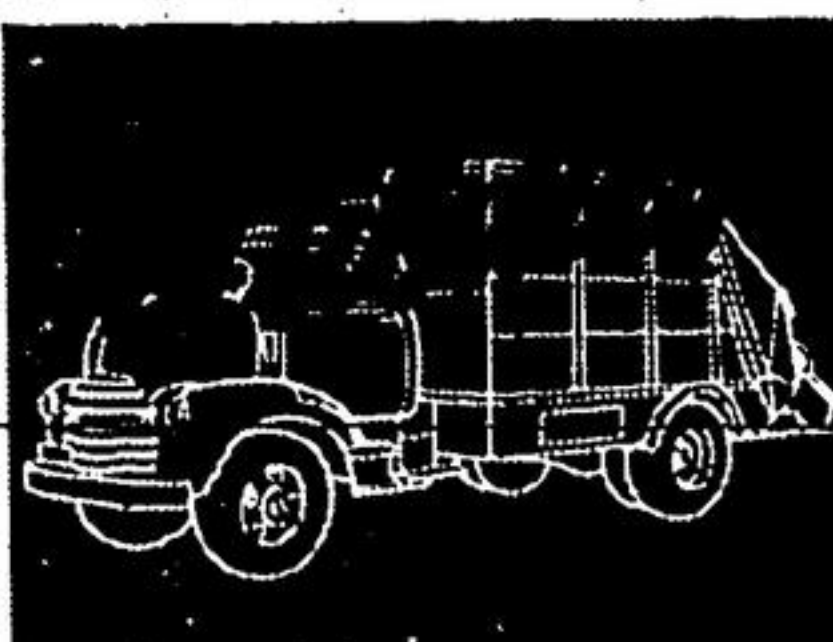
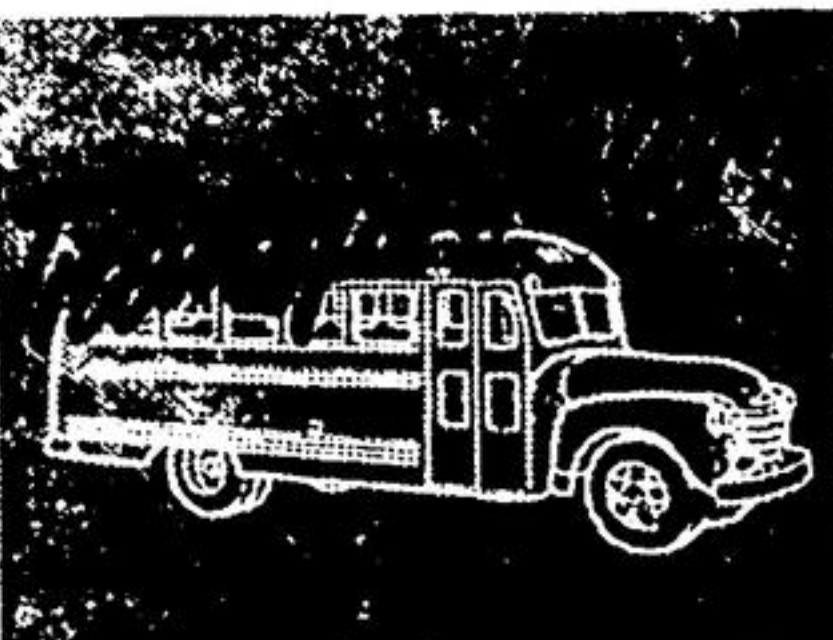
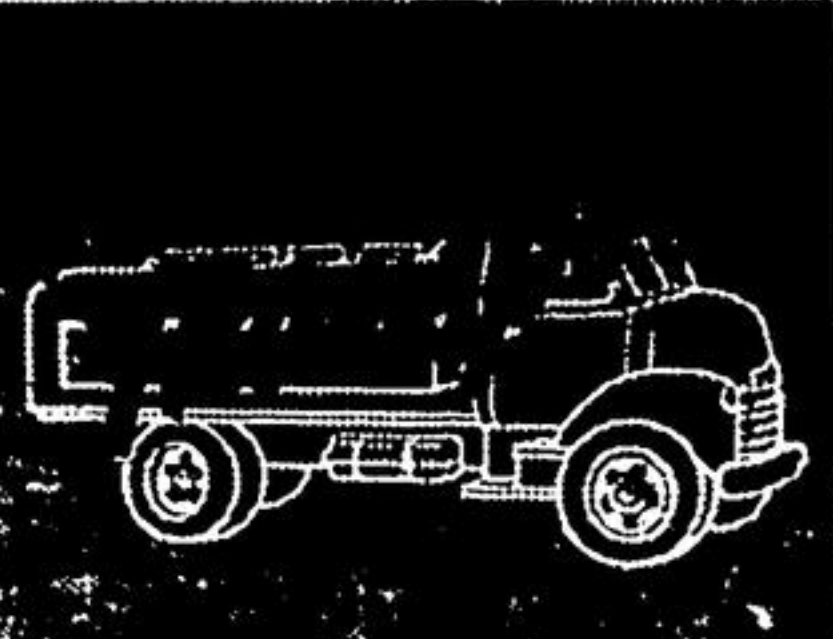
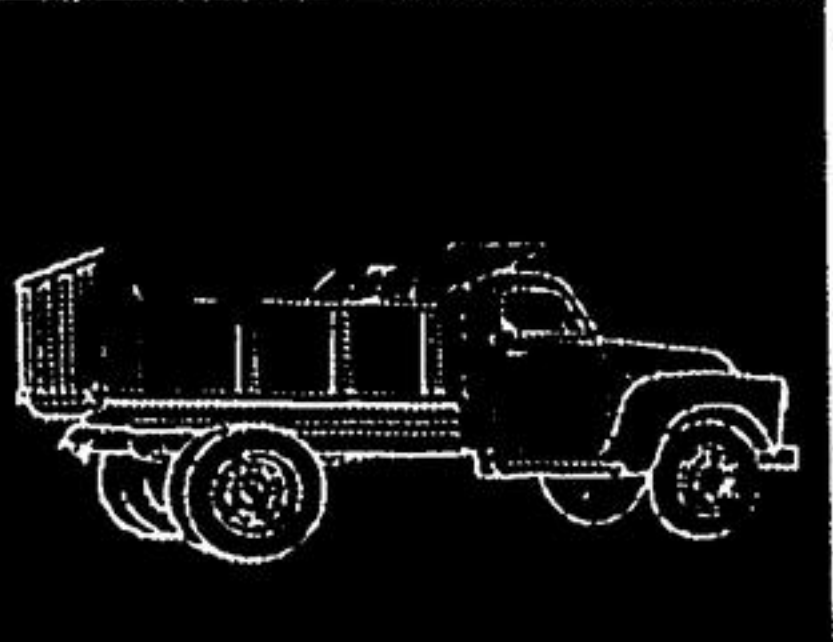
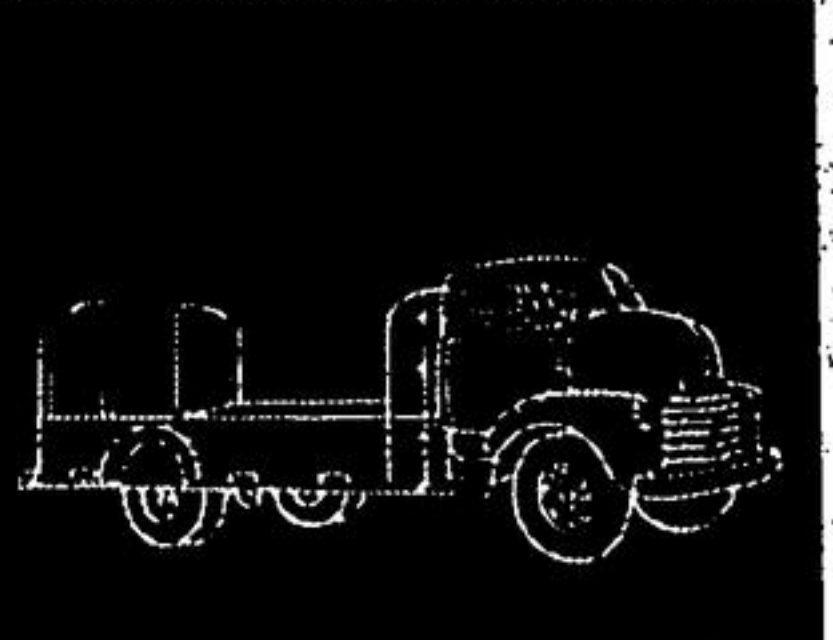
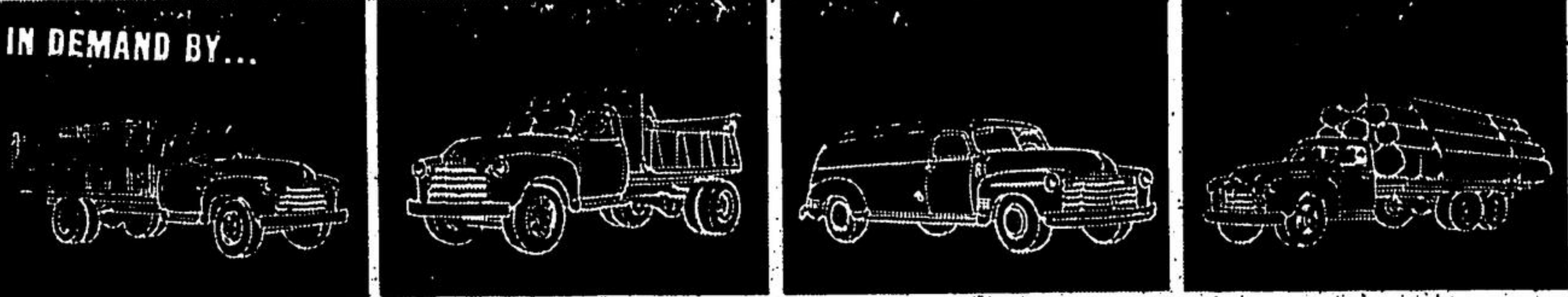
