#### Farm Fire Protection If Plan Goes Through

District farmers will have fire protection next year of similar quality to that enjoyed in Halton towns if plans under discussion are carried through. Milton town council has sparked the idea of providing adequate protection for farmers in that district and a series o meetings have been held at which the matter has been thoroughly dis-

According to Frank Thompson, Children's Aid Society supervisor in Halton and a member of Milton council, the idea is to maintain a second fire engine in Milton which will be available to farmers in a ten-mile radius of the county town. It would serve farmers in four townships - Nelson, Trafalgar, Esquesing and Nassagaweya. The balance of the two-southern townships is already served by equipment in other centres and a new engine in Milton would provide one hundred percent protection there. Only part of Esquesing and Nassagaweya would come under the scheme, as it is thought that an engine can only

Some cost basis would have to be worked out whereby farmers who ere protected by the equipment would pay a share of its cost and maintenance in their yearly tax payments. The question of housing is an important one as there is no room in the present Milton fire hall for extra equipment. The Milton fire brigade would assume the responsibility of manning the truck which would be reserved for township use only.

Civic officials are interested in the plan for two reasons. It provides fire protection for rural neighbours on whose welfare depends the 'town's welfare. More important, it will overcome a situation whereby town equipment paid for and maintained by local taxes will aways be on hand for town protection. At present in Milton the brigade attends fires in the townships and even though recompense is made there is always the danger of a fire occurring in town while the engine is away. This happened in Wingham earlier this year whena valuable feed mill was destroyed by fire while the Wingham brigade was answering a country call.
