Walter Thompson Retires As C.N.R. Press Head

The retirement of Walter S. Thompson as director of public relations, Canadian National system, and the appointment of G. Herbert Lash to that post, has been announced by Donald Gordon, chairman and president of the company.

The announcement also named Claude Melancon and Royd E. Beamish as assistant directors of public relations of the railway. The changes are effective October 22. Mr. Thompson, for twenty-eight years director of public relations for the National system joined the Grand Trunk as head of that railway's press department in 1914. Born at Newcastle on Tyne, the son of a Scottish newspaper editor, he retires this month under the pension rules of the company. He worked in London, with the St. James Gazette, the Daily Express, the Evening Standard, and the Observer and his newspaper career took him to Australasia before he came to Canada. He was city editor of the old Montreal Witness, and news editor of the Montreal Herald, prior to joining the Grand Trunk. In 1922 he was appointed director of publicity to the Canadian National Railways and in 1937 the publicity activities of Trans-Canada Air Lines were also placed under his direction. He voluntarily relinquished his airline duties in 1948 to devote full time to the railway.

The dean of Canada's public relations men, Mr. Thompson has travelled an average of 50,000 miles a year in maintaining personal contacts with public men, newspaper editors, writers, and business men. He has handled press relations for scores of distinguished visitors to Canada and the United States, including the Prince of Wales, King George VI and Queen Elizabeth and for the arrival in Canada of Governor-General Alexander.

Mr. Thompson became director of censorship on the outbreak of World War II, and later in 1939 he organized the department of public information at Ottawa.

Mr. Lash, who has been associated with Mr. Thompson for nearly thirty years, was born in St. John's, Newfoundland. He was educated in Montreal, Galt and at St. Andrew's College, Toronto.

Herb, as he is familiarly known to newsmen began his journalistic career with the Mail and Empire in Toronto in 1912, but after the outbreak of war he enlisted in the Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry. He gained his lieutenant's commission on the field at Courcellette where he was wounded on September 15, 1916. He won the Military Cross and Bar, and was also mentioned in Despatches. Returning to Canada in 1919, he resumed his newspaper work with the Mail and Empire, and when that publication acquired the Sunday World, he was appointed managing editor.

Mr. Lash joined the Canadian National Railways as publicity representative at Montreal in 1923. He transferred to Winnipeg in a similar capacity and remained in Western Canada until 1930, at which time he was appointed press representative in New York. In 1938 he returned to Montreal as assistant to Mr. Thompson.

In 1940, the government invited Mr. Lash to become director of public information for Canada, and he developed this branch of the country's war effort until 1942 when he returned to his railway work.

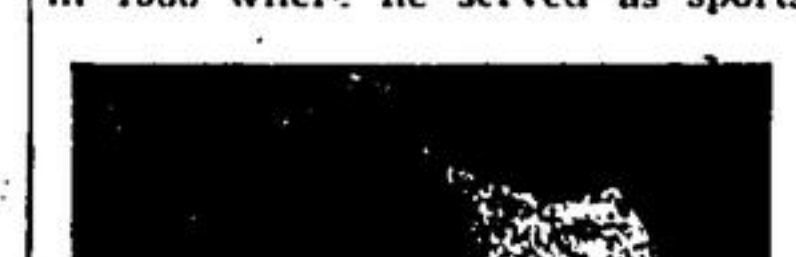

Montreal in 1895, and was educated at Saint-Mary College, Montreal, and the Brockville Business College. He joined La Presse as a reporter in 1918, and the following year was made parliamentary correspondent for that newspaper at Ottawa.

Mr. Melancon joined the Canadian National Railways at Montreal in 1923 as publicity representative, and in 1932 was made chief of the French services. In September, 1939 he moved to Ottawa as joint press censor for Canada, and in January, 1940, he was named associate director of public information. He returned to the railway in 1942, and in 1944 was appointed assistant director of public relations.

Royd Ellis Beamish was born in Port Arthur in 1911. He was educated in schools there, and studied commerce and finance at Queen's University in 1929-30. He joined the Port Arthur News Chronicle in 1930 where he served as sports

editor, reporter and feature writer, and assistant news editor. In 1938 he went to the Toronto Globe and Mail as a reporter covering the Ontario Legislature. Two years later he became parliamentary correspondent for that paper at Ottawa. In 1940 he joined the army as adjutant of a Port Arthur company of the Canadian Forestry Corps. While overseas in 1942 he transferred to the Lake Superior Regiment, and the same year was appointed public relations officer at First Canadian Army Headquarters. In 1943 he was made deputy assistant director of public relations with the rank of Major. He served in North Africa, Sicily and Italy and on returning to Canada in 1944 wrote a series of stories for the Canadian Army newspaper The Maple Leaf.

On receiving his discharge in 1945, Mr. Beamish joined the Financial Post and became assistant editor in 1946. In 1947 he was named to the editorial board of the Globe and Mail, and the following year was appointed press liaison officer of the Bank of Canada.
