Good prices were also realized — one cut glass dish selling as high as \$12.50, and other china and glass bringing almost as high prices. Many dealers in antiques were present and ran up the bids as they vied with one another. The sales also put a kink in the traffic in the Queen St. district, as cars lined the street from the highway to the station on both sides, making it impossible for two cars to pass. Provincial Police had to re-route traffic via McNabb and John Streets. The late Mr. John McBean, whose household effects were being sold, was one of the town's oldest residents and businessmen.
