## Rev. J. A. Tuer is Preacher For St. John's Anniversary

On Sunday, October 29, St. John's United Church held two special services in observance of the 111th Anniversary. The church was simply but beautifully decorated with chrysanthemums through the kindness of the 50-50 Club and the Women's Association. Rev. J. A. Tuer, M.A., B.D., of Laidlaw Memorial United Church, Hamilton, was the guest speaker and the worship was conducted by the minister, Rev. J. M. Smith. The sermon subject chosen by Mr. Tuer for his morning message was "Seeing God in History." In challenging terms he confronted the congregation with the fact that the moral law of God undergirds the whole life of man and that the nation, family or individual who refuses to live accordingly is shattered by the resulting conflict.

The evening message was entitled "Christ's Charter for the Church" and was a continuation of the morning theme showing that the Christian Church when she is true to Christ's Charter of vicarious love fulfills the great mission of harmonizing men with God's moral laws, and present the only true and abiding hope to mankind.

The Choir and Junior Choir under the able direction of Norman Laird and assisted by guests from Toronto provided special music for the occasion. At the morning worship the combined choirs sang "Let All Together Praise the Lord" and "The Prayer of Thanksgiving." The Junior Choir sang "The Crusader's Hymn" as an offertory. The anthem was entitled "O Clap Your Hands Together" and a quartette comprised of Ferné Caird, Dorothy King, Jack Norris, and Jack Patterson sang "Lord I Was Blind." As the evening contribution the choir sang two anthems, "King All Glorious" in which Ruth Thompson sang the solo parts, and "Glorious Is Thy Name." Mr. Jack Patterson, baritone, sang the solo "He Smiled On Me" and a trio comprised of Mary Kidney, Ruth Thompson and Pearl Bishop offered "Pans Angelicus" Myrtle and Jack Norris sang the duet "My Task" and the Junior Choir sang the "Prayer from Hansel and Gretel" as an offertory.

The scriptures chosen for the day were two great and challenging passages, one from the Old Testament, Micah 6:1-3, and one from the New Testament, Luke 10: 25-37.

On Monday evening members and adherents of the congregation met in St. John's Memorial Hall for a congregational dinner prepared by the ladies. Mr. N. Laird and Mrs. G. Kidney provided music for the occasion and remarks of appreciation were expressed by P. B. Harrison to the ladies of the congregation and to the Director of Music, and by E. Forgrave, Chairman of the Committee of Stewards to the congregation for their efforts in promoting the work of St. John's. A film, entitled "And Now I See" carrying a challenging message was shown as a fitting conclusion of the anniversary observances.

## NORVAL 90th Birthday Sunday For Mr. George Gollop

On Guy Fawkes Day, Sunday, November 5th, William George (Geordie) Gollop of Norval joins the "Over Ninety" birthday club. He will be at home to his many friends from three to five that afternoon and from seven to nine in the evening.

Mr. Gollop was born in Norval, November 5th, 1860. The village school he attended is still in use. He took up residence in Toronto in 1886, moved to North Bend, Nebraska, in 1898 and returned to Norval in 1919 where he has since made his home. He has one son, George E. Gollop. His wife, Sarah Cusick, of Moffat died in 1944 in her ninth year.

Mr. Gollop is in excellent health and active. He has just completed the replanting of several thousand tulip bulbs and is looking forward to an even better showing of them next spring than this year, when ten thousand Darwins made his home and garden the show place of Norval.

The Gollops have been prominent in the life of the village since Mr. Gollop's father arrived there from his native Somerset, England, in 1849.

## GREEN WILLIAMS Education Minister Officiates At New Glen School Dedication

A milestone in the history of Glen Williams was the official opening of the beautiful new three-room school Monday evening. Hon. Dana Porter, K.C., Ontario Minister of Education, was an honoured guest and pronounced the school opened after commenting briefly on the importance of the occasion.

Mr. Porter said that education is not for a select few but is for everyone. It isn't easy, for something new must be learned each day and the work made progressively harder in order that children's minds shall develop. Beautiful surroundings do not necessarily mean that education is good, but he pointed out that such a building must have on teachers and pupils alike in reducing fatigue and making their lessons pleasant.

Stanley Hall, Provincial member of parliament for Halton and school inspector, L. L. Skuce were also speakers, as was Esquering reeve George Currie. John Bingham, chairman of the township school area board which administers the school, was chairman for the evening and briefly sketched the details of the new building which was constructed by J. B. Mackenzie and Son, wired, and heated by George Muckart and painted by McLeod and Frank of Acton. Murton and Evans of Hamilton were architects.

Prior to the speeches, school pupils presented a musical program which included songs by the choir led by the new school principal John Cantelon and a dance by the juniors. Sylvia Diggins and Jacqueline Lucas played piano duets and a double trio sang, members of which were Sylvia Diggins, Carol Crosby, Leonard Benstead, Jimmy Schenk, Jacqueline Lucas and Maureen Heppburn.

Miss Marion Heppburn, music teacher at the school, accompanied at the piano and also sang two numbers with Mrs. Jack Addy at the piano.
