**LIONS PROMOTE NEW CLUB IN ERIN VILLAGE**

Georgetown Lions Club may sponsor a new club in Erin if enough interest is shown by residents of that village. Don Barrager heads a fact-finding committee which will visit Erin and talk to community leaders there in an effort to form a new club. The club took this step at a directors' meeting last Wednesday in the Municipal Building. The club is planning to hold the next dinner meeting at Hilltop Lodge, Erin and will invite some Erin residents to that meeting.

**Four in Field For Liberal Leadership**

Delegates from every part of Ontario will meet in Toronto on November 9th and 10th to choose a new leader for the provincial Liberal party. It is announced. Election of a Liberal leader was made necessary by the retirement from that position of Farquhar Oliver, who was selected for the job by the 1947 party convention.

In addition to naming the man who may be the next Premier of Ontario, the 900 delegates and some 300 alternates will have two busy days of business, including the endorsement of the official Liberal policy and electing officers of the Ontario Liberal Association.

Of the greatest public interest is the choice of the Liberal leader. Nominations for the post will be received up to 3 p.m. on the first day of the convention. Nomination papers at this convention must be signed by at least 20 delegates, rather than a minimum of 10 which was the number required in past conventions.

To date four prominent Liberals have announced their intention of seeking the leadership. They are: Jack Brown, M.L.A., Kitchener, who has been financial critic for the party in the Legislature; Campbell Calder, M.L.A., London; Arnott Hicks, Hamilton city controller and Walter Thomson, K.C., Pickering, M.P. for Ontario. Since nominations are open until November 9th, additional candidates may enter the field, of course.

Next to the leadership, chief interest surrounds the statement of policy which will be submitted by Colin Campbell on behalf of the party's management committee for approval of the convention. A 5,000 word document, the draft policy covers every aspect of provincial public affairs, including municipal affairs, liquor, the franchise, Ontario Civil Service, cost of living, highways, welfare and social security, labor legislation, recreation, education, housing, hydro electric power, and natural resources.

First day of the convention will be devoted to the reception of reports, election of officers in the Ontario Liberal Association, and nominations for the leadership. The second day will take up the party policy and election of the leader.

To be held at the Royal York Hotel, the convention will have its joint chairmen, Norman L. Matthews, K.C., president of the association and Leo Gauthier, M.P., Sudbury.
