So long, Delly! It was with a twinge of regret we learned that one of Georgetown's graduates of Gord Alcott's Midget NHL league of 1935-36, who went on to make quite an impressive record in the hockey world, has decided to hang 'up his skates and stick.

Delly Beasment started out in the old midget league playing for New York Americans and wore the name of Art Chapman, then a star in the NHL, on his back. Delly's playmaking ability was typical of the name he bore. The Georgetown midget all-star team, which played in Copper Cliff had Delly on the roster. The following year he played juvenile and junior for Georgetown.

In 1937-38 Auror, anxious to secure the services of this much-talked-about junior fought hard to retain him as professional scouts were more than interested.

Delly's next appearance was in a Toronto Marlboro uniform, playing Junior A. "Dooney" Evans, who tended goal for Georgetown in later years, and after that for Acton, was goalie for that team and both boys were being watched closely for further advancement in the Maple Leaf chain. That particular season Delly led the league in scoring. Playing twenty games, he had 57 points, 38 of which were goals. Marlboros were knocked out by St. Mike's in the first round of the playoffs and St. Mike's grabbed Delly to finish the season out with them. Bradford won the Junior A championship that year.

The war was taking the cream of the hockey crop and Delly signed on with the navy. While in Toronto, taking training he played for Stoncys and the CPR team in the THL. Shipped out to Montreal he played a few games with the Junior A Montreal Royals before he left Canada.

In the navy Delly found a berth with a senior team in Nobe, Scotland and was once again top scorer. After discharge, his professional career thwarted by war, he came home to Georgetown and the Raiders were only too glad when he decided to come out as a regular. With Delly and a few more able players, Georgetown decided started to loom on the hockey horizon as the team to watch.

Since 1945 he has been a Raider's star, playing Intermediate A hockey this year. Brampton and Weston have both dropped their entry from this group. Dundas are still questionable.
