Norval Minister Called to Knox Church, Midland

J. Leonard Self will take the pastorate of Knox Presbyterian Church, Midland, in January. Mr. Self announced to his congregation at Norval and Union Sunday his decision to accept a call to the Midland church where he had preached for several years.

Mr. Self's departure will be a loss to the Norval Community. He has been a recreational director for several years. Under his guidance activities as hockey, baseball, and soccer, the Stay-at-home and hobby show have had interest for boys and men and women and he will be difficult to replace.

Mr. Self came to Norval in 1943, succeeding Rev. Arthur Leggett who is now a teacher at Vancouver Bible College. A native of Toronto, he is the son of Mr. and Mrs. James Harlow. He is a graduate of the University of Western Ontario and holds his Master of Arts and Bachelor of Divinity degrees from the University of Toronto.

Mr. Self is at present secretary of Young People's Society and Sunday Schools in Toronto. He has served as a moderator on two occasions at the pulpits of the Georgetown Union churches were empty. He is a member of Credit Lodge, No. 1, and a member of Georgetown Lions Club. For four years he has taught annual training at the Public School.

Mr. Self has played an active role in Norval not only as recreational director but as a participant on many occasions during the early war years. He was two seasons with Norval and two seasons with Norval and OHA entry and has lately been a member of the Businessmen's team in the industrial league.

Mr. Self is also a member of the Businessmen's softball team. In Midland, he will succeed the late A. C. Stewart, past moderator who was minister there for 15 years prior to his sudden death in Montreal this year while on his way to the General Assembly.

Mr. Stewart was at one time minister of Knox Church in Fairville. He has a congregation of 600. Mr. Self is one of three brothers in the ministry. Rev. Russell Self is a missionary in the Jansil field in Africa. A younger brother, Stanley, is a first year student at Knox.

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City Health Inspector Was Landscape Painter

A resident of Georgetown since September 1st, when he moved here from Toronto, John Mason Coghill died last Friday in Guelph General Hospital.

Mr. Coghill was an inspector with the Toronto health department for forty years. He was born in Toronto, the son of Capt. Alex. Coghill, who established the first drydock in the city at the foot of Cherry Street. He was a member of Ruy-nymede Baptist Church and the L.O.L.

Mr. and Mrs. Coghill purchased the house on Arletta Street formerly occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Ron Laitmer before they moved to Limehouse. Their son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. William Copeland are also new residents in town, Mr. Copeland having taken a position with Smith and Stone, Ltd.

Mr. Coghill was a talented artist. He specialized in oil landscapes and has one picture hanging in Toronto East General Hospital. He received honourable mention on several occasions for entries in the art show at the Canadian National Exhibition.

Remembrance Service At St. John's Church

A Remembrance Day Service calling to prayerful remembrance the sacrifice and tragedy of the two world wars was held on Sunday morning at St. John's United Church. Reverend J. M. Smith read the lesson from Romans, Chapter 12, and based his remarks on the theme: "Our Best Tribute." In speaking of the Day of Remembrance, he referred to it as a "Day of Remembrance," "Day of Self-Examination," "Day of Humiliation" and "Day of Challenge." The best tributes that we could pay, he said, was to present ourselves as living sacrifices for Christ and His Kingdom.

The names of those from the congregation who paid the supreme sacrifice in the two wars were read and a period of prayerful silence was observed. The names are to be seen inscribed along with the names of all who served on the two Honour Rolls hanging in the church cloak-rooms and in the Book of Remembrance in the Memorial Room. The choir under the direction of E. Laird sang two fitting anthems—"For All the Saints" and "O Valiant Hearts."
