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## Georgetown Soldiers at Fort Lewis, Washington

Several Georgetown soldiers are among troops who are moving into Fort Lewis, Washington, for advanced training before their final destination, Korea.

The men are members of Canada's Special Force, recruited for service with the United Nations Forces at present battling the North Korean army which invaded South Korea.

According to daily newspaper reports, it is doubtful if the Canadians will have a long stop at Fort Lewis because the military establishment is needed to train American troops. Their next move for training may be Okinawa, a battleground in World War 2.

Three thousand Canadians had arrived at Fort Lewis by Sunday, including members of the RCME, Royal 22nd Regiment and various special advance units. Five troop trains on Monday brought the Royal Canadian Regiment 2nd Battalion, The Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry arrived yesterday and is slated to proceed to Pusan, South Korea, by boat from Seattle soon.

It will be divorced from the rest of the Brigade and will not come under Brigadier Rockingham but under Department of National Defence through the United Nations. The Special Force commander will remain to train the rest of the Brigade.

The Pats will be supplied in training by a body of men now in Canada to be designated as the 3rd Battalion PPCLI.

The situation is subject to change without notice. A few days ago it seemed that Canada's Special Force might be sent to support the garrison of the occupying powers in Western Germany. The unexpected appearance of Chinese communists on the Korean front has brought the original objective, Korea, back to the fore.

Letters reaching their families in town confirm the fact that Ptes. Louis Brandford, Earl Beerman, Allan and Ron Edmunds will have reached Fort Lewis by now. Pte. Brandford mentioned that Mike Lorrain, who trained with him at Petawawa left a few days earlier with a party of cooks bound for the same destination. Earl is a member of the Princess Pats who took their training in the west in Alberta. Pte. Brandford and the Edmunds brothers belong to the Royal Canadian Regiment.

Last word of Carl Nellis, a teller at the Bank of Commerce when he enlisted, was that after his "last wave" from Camp Shilo he expected to be bound for Fort Lewis with the Royal Canadian Artillery.

Pte. Wesley Hills mailed a postcard from Vancouver over the weekend, and will also be at Fort Lewis now. He trained with the Royal Canadian Regiment at Petawawa.

Ptes. Bill James and Jim Brandford are still in Calgary with the Princess Pats and expect to have a wave at home before they are posted to another centre.

John Brian Pickett, 6-month-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Pickett, of Lime Ridge, died in the Hospital for Sick Children, Toronto, on Sunday. The baby was taken suddenly ill with a sore throat infection of similar type to that reported the daily papers last week.

He is survived by his parents and brother Wayne, age 3.

Funeral services were conducted at the funeral home of S.S. Russell Son, Oakville. Interment was in Bethel Cemetery.

## Schomberg Cow Has World 2x Record



A world record for two-year-old heifers has been broken by Orchard Vale Laura Texal, a Holstein owned by Cecil Atkinson & Son of Schomberg. She is pictured above with the original directors and bull purchasing committee of the Maple Cattle Breeders Association. Her sire was Lonelmei Texal Ideal, the first bull purchased and used when the Association's artificial insemination unit was organized in 1945.

Orchard Vale Laura Texal, graded Good Plus three days before the completion of her 365 day record on twice a day milking, piled up the remarkable production of 22,005 lbs. of milk, with 787 lbs. of fat, equivalent to 275 cans or 8,800 qts. of milk.

While Laura's record is nearly 9,000 lbs. over her dams at the same age this cannot be considered as a flash in the pan. Three other two-year-olds in the herd sired by Lonelmei Texal Antony, second bull used by the Maple unit, and still in service, have an average of 16,558 lbs. of milk and 588 lbs. of fat on twice-a-day milking.

From the original ten mile radius served by the Maple Cattle Breeders' Association, which is headed by R. J. Darlington of Maple, with G. W. Keffer also of Maple, as secretary-manager, the insemination unit has spread until it now serves the counties of Halton, Peel, York, Ontario, Victoria, Peterboro, Simcoe, Dufferin and since October 1st, Grey and two districts south and east of North Bay. To the original Holstein breed Ayrshire, Jersey, Guernsey and Shorthorn batteries have since been added, making a total of 34 bulls available to members of the unit.
