COUNTY REVISION COURT FOR ASSESSMENT APPEALS

A county board of revision has been established to hear appeals against the 1951 assessment in all Halton municipalities. No date has yet been set for the hearing of appeals in Georgetown but it is expected that this will be arranged sometime early in December.

The county board is something new for Georgetown where in the past it has been customary for a five-man board to be appointed from sitting members of the town council. As a rule there have been few appeals and often the meeting of the court has been a mere formality with no appeals made at all.

With the new assessment in effect next year and a complete new basis established for assessing, this year the story may be different. Local properties have seen some radical changes, and there will be many who will be paying more taxes and many who will be paying less.

All local assessment notices have now been delivered by assessment commissioner Joseph Gibbons. Should a property owner feel that he is improperly assessed he may complain in writing to the assessment commissioner within fourteen days after the 15th of November. This written appeal must be made in order for the case to be brought before the court of revision.

Lt.-Col. Gordon Brown, a member of North Halton High School District board who lives near town at the Stewarttown-Cheek Line corner is a member of the new board. Others are T. Jones, Acton; Alex Near, Rockwood; John Blair, Burlington; and W. Anderson, Oakville. Remuneration will be \$7.00 a day with a 10c mileage allowance.

Trafalgar Township objected to not having representation on the new board when it was established at the last County Council meeting. Reeve W. H. Biggar said he could not support the motion in view of the large contribution Trafalgar makes to Halton.

Reeve Kenneth Dick of Milton said he was satisfied as long as competent men were appointed although he was disappointed to see three farmers on the board. He would prefer to have a manufacturer, a farmer, a merchant and one who is familiar with residential property.

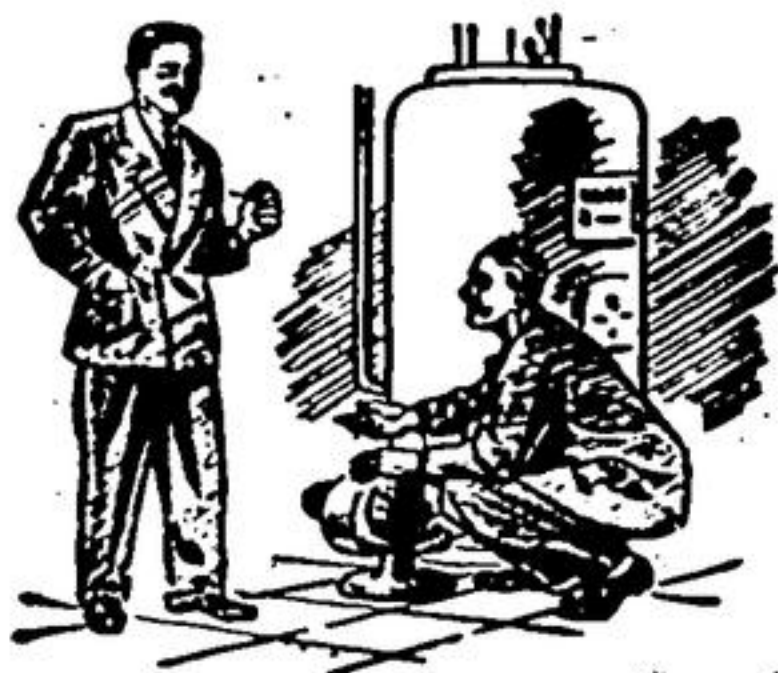
