After the election, the new president, Mr. McCleary thanked the meeting for the confidence placed in him, and said that he would do his utmost to further the party's interests in the riding. He felt that with a lot of work, and organization, Halton would return a Conservative member in the next Federal election as well as maintaining our Provincial member in the Ontario legislature.

The president then called on the speaker of the evening, Mr. Ed Goodman, brilliant young Toronto lawyer, who had played an important part in organizing the campaigns of recently elected M.P.'s J. M. McDonnell, and George Hees. Mr. Goodman spoke on his work in these campaigns, and brought forth a good many excellent suggestions to the meeting.

Stan Hall, Halton's provincial representative, gave the delegates an excellent talk on his work in the legislature, and paid tribute to leader Hon. George Drew, who Mr. Hall said had, as the records would prove, introduced more sound pro-

gressive legislation than any other premier in Canadian history. He also paid tribute to the then premier Drew, for his long fight against the forces of Communism, which had engendered so much hatred on the part of the two Communist members in the legislature that he (Mr. Hall) had seen them rise to their feet, screaming they would "get" Mr. Drew before they were finished. Mr. Hall then introduced as he put it, Halton's returned "tourist", Miss Sybil Bennett, K.C., Georgetown lawyer, who had only returned, a short time before the meeting from a three week speaking tour of the West. Miss Bennett, in her own easy style, gave the listeners a resume of her trip and impressions of the west, ending on the note that although tremendously impressed by the provinces she had seen, and touching on the tremendous farms of Saskatchewan, and the booming oil fields of Alberta, that there was no place for her quite like her native Province of Ontario and County of Halton.

After the meeting closed, lunch and coffee were served by a group of ladies under the convener'ship of Mrs. Carl Martin.

### Farmer OK Needed For Hunt Privilege Hunters Reminded

"Go in by the front gate rather than over the back fence."

This is the timely suggestion offered by the Ontario Department of Lands & Forests to hunters planning to shoot game in settled farming areas.

The advice follows on the heels of complaints from land owners that many thoughtless nimrods were trampling down their fences, stampeding and endangering their livestock and firing rifles and shotguns near farmhouses thereby jeopardizing the lives and safety of the occupants.

"There seems to be some confusion among hunters as to the rights conferred on them by a gun licence," comments an official of the Department. "Some hunters seem to think that it gives them the privilege of entering private property without the consent of the owner. This is definitely not the case."

"The truth of the matter is" the spokesman says, "that all hunters are free to enter Crown lands — unless they are Game Preserves or Provincial Parks—but private landowners still have an absolute right to admit whom they please and exclude whom they please from their lands."

There are several "musts" for a hunter to follow if he desires to make a friend, instead of an enemy, out of the farmer, the officer pointed out. These are:

First of all ask the farmer for permission to hunt on his land.

Never, under any circumstance, point or discharge firearms, at near, or in the direction of, farmhouses or buildings, cattle, sheep, horses, dogs, poultry or — most important — other human beings.

Use gates to enter fields. Crawl under instead of over fences if possible. If a fence must be climbed do so near the post to which it is fastened as it is less likely to break or sag at this point.

Don't be above offering or doing small services for the farmer in appreciation for hunting privileges.

If the farmer asks you not to enter, or asks you to leave his land, do so without argument.

"A true sportsman realizes that hunting, especially on private land, is a privilege, rather than a right," it was stated. Being aware of this he will follow these few simple rules at all times, realizing that by so doing he will be welcomed back by the farmer each year; protect the welfare of his sport and demonstrate to his fellow sportsmen that he is considerate of the rights and welfare of other people.

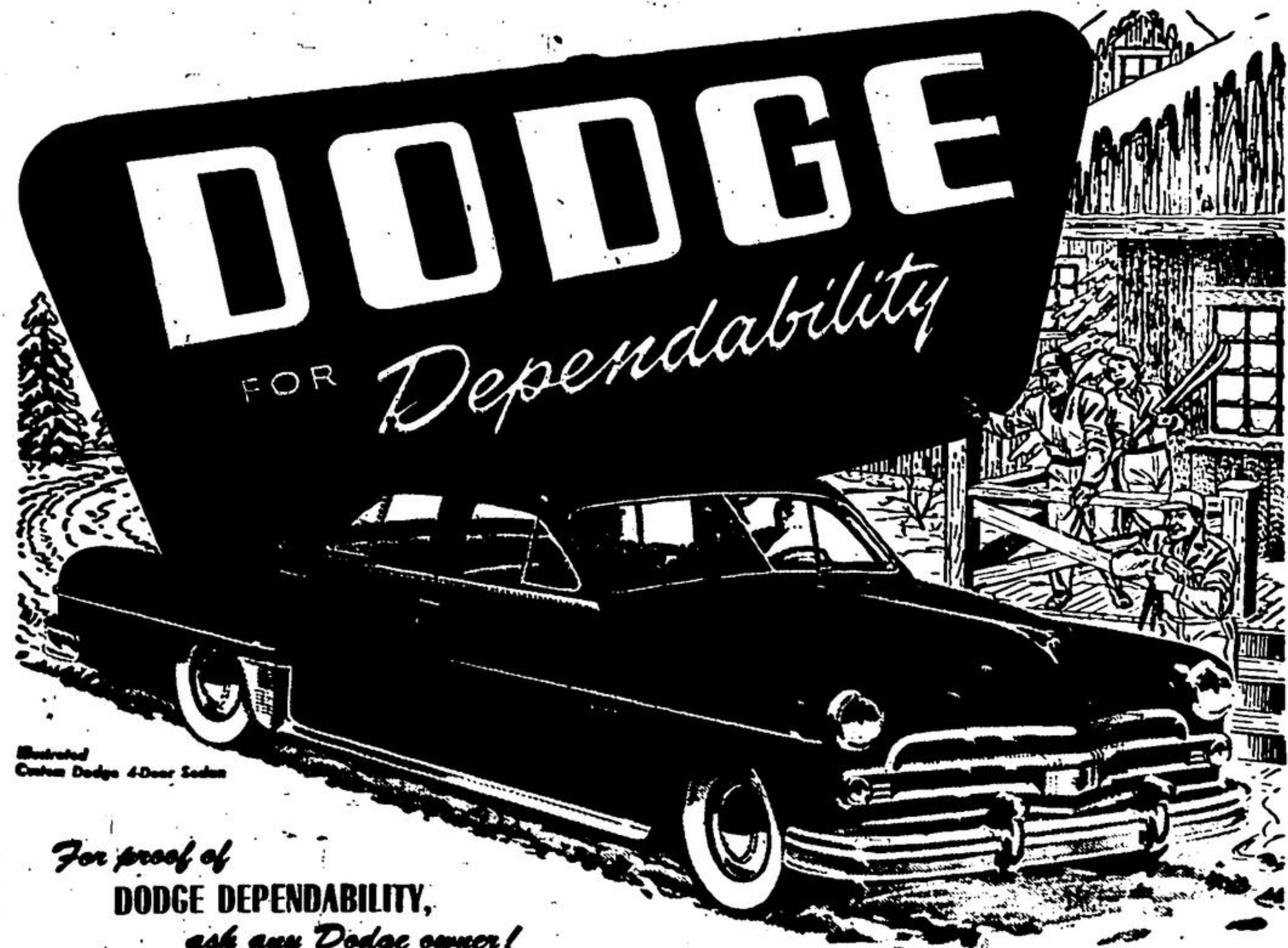
