**Another Goodbye**  
 This week we tear to file retirement of town defence star Leigh Bradbury. No one, including Leigh, knew that when he skated onto the ice in Stouffville a week ago Saturday, he was making his swan song in a Raider uniform. A collision with former Raider star Hal Gibson which did some damage to Leigh's jaw necessitating an operation last week brought on the decision to hang up his skates and leave Georgetown without the services of a star defence performer. He'll still be around in his capacity as coach of the Junior Raiders.

Homebyme was where Leigh started out on his hockey career. Furthering his schooling and hockey ambitions he went to Toronto to study and play Junior B hockey for his school where he wore the team colours for three years. In 1942 he joined the Geraldton Gold Miners, a senior outfit playing against teams like Fort Arthur Bearcats and Fort William Sailors. The Bearcats signed him up the next year and he played in exhibition games against such profession performers as Gus Bodnar and Bud Poile. The team was eliminated in the playoffs by Winnipeg Blue Bombers, but it was no disgrace for the western team was composed mostly of pros who were in the armed forces. Edgar Laprade and Wally Stanowski of New York Rangers, Pete Langelle, now playing in the minors, Bill Juzda were among them. Ottawa Senators defeated Winnipeg later.

Charlie Sands, a former star for Boston Bruins, scouted Leigh for Pasadena Panthers, a team which he coached in the Pacific Coast professional circuit, and the Bradburys moved to California for a couple of seasons.

Wanting something closer to home Leigh came to Georgetown where after a brief spell with Vic Diggin's Federal Sales he took a position as assistant purchasing agent at Smith and Stone, Ltd. He found a spot with the Raiders and was a member of the championship teams of 1948 and 1950.
