Kitchener Hospital**

Former resident of town, Mr. L. Fleck who moved to Kitchener months ago is recuperating at Mary's Hospital there after suffering a coronary thrombosis. His recovery will be pleased to know that he is making good progress.

Fleck is one of Georgetown's prominent citizens and during his residence here took an active part in town affairs. He is an ex-councillor of Halton County, having been accorded this honour when he was reeve of the town. He organized the Georgetown Coaling Mill, which later became part of Alliance Mills, Ltd., and until his death a few years ago was manager of the Georgetown division. He was president of the company. Fleck has been active in town affairs, county Progressive Conservative circles and for many years was a member of the executive and also served as president of the County Association.

**Niagara Bishop Opposes
Commercial Sunday Sport**

Bishop Walter Bagnall of Niagara issued a letter read in all churches in the diocese on Sunday advising all Anglicans to let their consciences be their guide on the issue of Sunday sport.

Comments on the question of Sunday sport are mooted this year for Hamilton and Oakville, and the bishop outlined his opposition in a letter.

Bishop Bagnall advised — "We should, I feel, be careful not to improve motives to all those who favour commercialized sport on Sunday. Many of them are simply people who feel quite honestly that such a step would not interfere with worship or have an adverse effect on character. We must, therefore, consider this matter without prejudice or exaggeration, but with moderation and logic."

Because the tempo of life has speeded up, the Bishop said, man requires a day of rest in the week. He called the Sunday sport issue "thin edge of the wedge" to an end on Sunday.

To him the most important point in the whole question is that it is another aspect of the age-old struggle between spiritual and material values," his letter added.

**Prominent Churchman
Anglican Primate Dies**

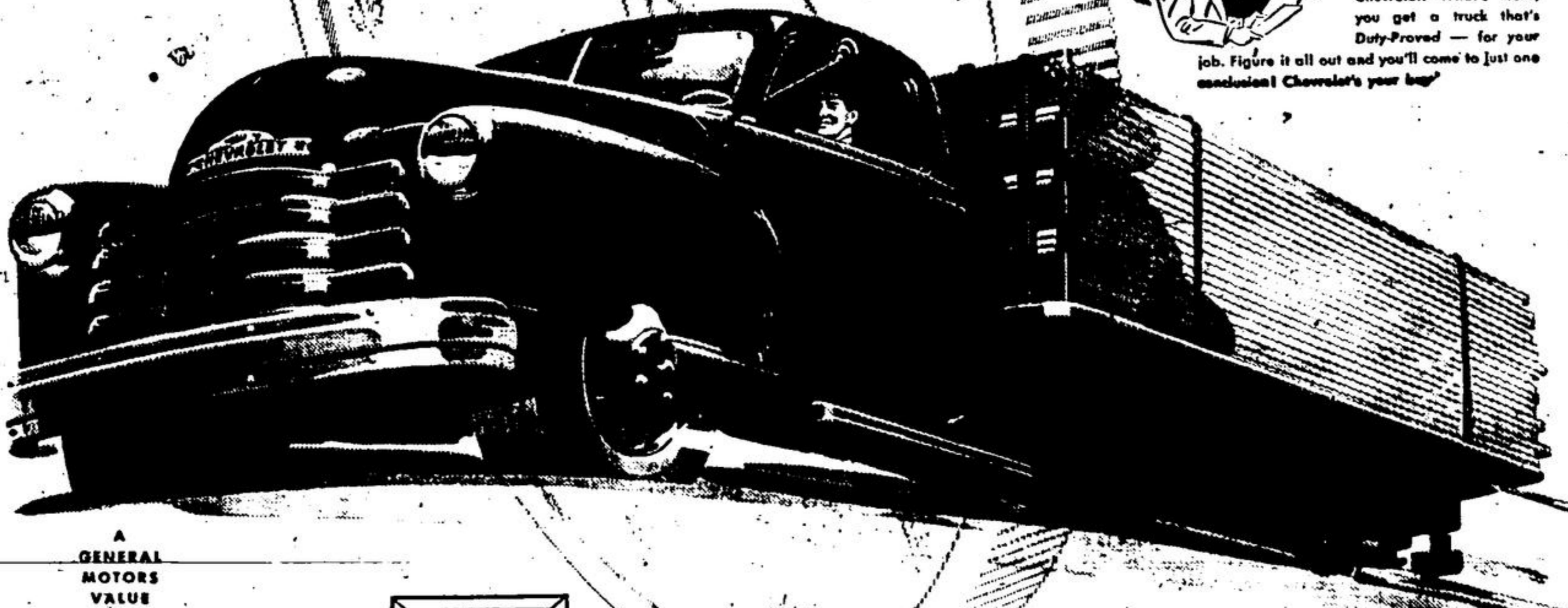
Most Reverend George Frederick Kingston, Primate of the Church of Canada died Monday at Ontario General Hospital, after suffering a heart attack the week before. Archbishop Kingston had come to Toronto to attend the annual meeting of the Canadian Council of Churches. He was taken ill after a radio-broadcast Sunday afternoon a week ago.

The 61-year-old Primate had headed the Anglican church since 1947 when he succeeded the late Archbishop Derwyn T. Owen of Toronto.

Born in Prescott, he taught for 15 years in a rural school at Carleton Place, Ontario, before entering Trinity College, graduating in 1916. He continued his education at King's College, Windsor, N.S., University of Toronto, Oxford and Cambridge, and was appointed professor of Philosophy at King's University in 1922. He became professor of Theology at Trinity.

In 1940 he was elected Bishop of Nova Scotia and four years later became Bishop of Nova Scotia. His only son, Rev. F. Temple Kingston, is a naval padre at Cornwallis.
